ood afternoon and welcome to The Memorial Stadium for our match against Swindon Town.

Welcome, also, to Swindon Head Coach Luke Williams and his staff and players, along with the club's supporters who have made the short trip along the M4 to Bristol this afternoon.

It seems a long time since our last home game, against Northampton Town, when we scored four goals in the opening 24 minutes and were positive and bright throughout.

We were ruthless in front of goal and scored again in the second half to complete a superb victory. It was, of course, a great afternoon for Ellis Harrison who scored four of our goals which was an excellent personal achievement.

Unfortunately, we have since suffered successive 3-1 defeats on our travels, at Fleetwood and Walsall.

At Fleetwood our defending in the opening 25 minutes was poor and we presented our hosts with two goals. Once that happened we were chasing the game and although we did pull a goal back in the second half we conceded again before the end of the match.

I didn't think our overall performance was that bad, and we did create scoring opportunities, but that is scant consolation and defeat left me feeling very disappointed. It was a similar story at Walsall last Saturday when, after their goalkeeper had pulled off a couple of great saves, we conceded a very sloppy goal on the stroke of half time from a set piece. After the break we conceded two more sloppy goals and were left chasing another game.

I don't think I can ask any more from my players in terms of effort but I can ask them to defend a lot better than they are doing and we will continue to work hard to eradicate the errors from our game.

We are in a transitional period at the moment and, as you will know, some players have been advised that their futures lie away from The Memorial Stadium, while new players have

been brought in during the last few weeks.

I would like to formally welcome Joe Partington, Joe Lumley, Ryan Sweeney and Jonathan Burn to the club and wish them every success during their time with us.

I know that you will give them your support and encouragement and I'm sure they will enjoy playing for such passionate supporters.

The atmosphere generated by almost 2,000 Gasheads at Walsall last week was exceptional and I would like to thank everyone who travelled to The Banks's Stadium. There should be a great atmosphere inside The Mem today and I hope you all enjoy the match.



SLOW BOAT TO CHINA



efore the present January transfer window came into play we could all be forgiven for thinking that a mass exodus to China was the order of the day.

At the end of 2016 Chelsea manager Antonio Conte was quoted as saying, "Chinese football is a danger for all teams"

I would suspect that this thinking came on the back of Chinese spending soaring to £200m before the start of the 2016 season. The comment would have been compounded by speculation surrounding Chelsea midfielder Oscar and the fact that the Chinese transfer record was broken three times in ten days, as Chelsea's Brazilian midfielder Ramires was signed by Jiangsu Suning

for £25m, followed by Guangzhou Evergrande Taobao buying Colombia striker Jackson Martinez for £31m from Atletico Madrid.

Jiangsu then paid Shakhtar Donetsk £38.4m for Brazilian midfielder Alex Teixeira.

However, the fee for Teixeira was eclipsed by the £46.1m paid by Shanghai SIPG for Zenit St Petersburg's Brazil forward Hulk during the mid season summer window.

The Chinese Super league presently comprises 16 clubs and I am sure the signing of what may be seen as among the top players worldwide would help to promote and raise the standards of the game in China. However, it is well to understand that China is a State with a very high level of political control

and it is the objectives of the Chinese government that will ultimately set the agenda.

The government wants China to be a 'world football superpower' by 2050 and aims to develop a national team capable of winning the World Cup. That means the development of Chinese players is paramount and given that they are currently ranked 83rd in the world there is a lot of work to do. The Chinese government's ten year plan, 2015-2025, is to build 20,000 football schools producing 100,000 players. The country, by all reports, wants to host and win the World Cup in the next 15 years.

It was not entirely surprising therefore to read that Chinese Super League

clubs will only be allowed to play three non Chinese players per game in their next season beginning in March. A rule change has reduced the number of foreigners allowed in a move that will result in a slow down of the wave of big money signings from Europe and elsewhere. A Chinese statement says the new measures will address irrational investments in overseas players.

Chelsea striker Diego Costa has been linked with a move to China but the move now seems to be unlikely with Conte now saying that the Costa Chinese speculation is finished. It looks like a quick flight to China has become a slow boat after all. The Chinese transfer window runs from 1st January and closes on 28th February.

HAT TRICKS AND MORE

efensive frailties, especially away from home, are currently taking some of the gloss off an otherwise hugely enjoyable return to League One.

Rovers have not suffered six consecutive defeats on the road since a very different period at this club, the dismal dregs of Mark McGhee's brief reign, when he failed to gain a single point from his final six away matches in charge. But that's where the similarities with today's team ends.

Rather than dwell on the negativity of those sobering losses on Rovers' travels, I would rather highlight some of the impressive landmarks which have been achieved so far this season. Describing the 5-0 demolition of Northampton Town here three weeks ago as the best Rovers performance of the campaign to date does not begin to do it justice. It was in fact a very significant day within the context of the club's entire Football League history.

Almost six years since he made a surprise debut under Stuart Campbell at Southampton, Ellis Harrison scored a seven minute hat trick. My phone was red hot in the first half, as friends were texting me to ask if it was the fastest Rovers treble

ever. Instinct told me that it was the quickest that I had seen in my time, and that was confirmed when I found a list judiciously compiled by Mike Jay at the time of another rapid fire hat-trick just over a year ago, when Matty Taylor banged in three goals in just 12 minutes here against Wycombe. That is now the sixth fastest hat trick in the club's history, while the one scored by Ellis against the Cobblers has only been surpassed by the astonishing achievement of Dai Ward, who took just four minutes to score three against Doncaster Rovers in a second tier game in 1956. After the game, I was delighted to learn that one of the regular viewers of the Screen Soccer highlights in the Clubhouse Bar. Brian Fox, had attended that game back in Rovers' golden era, so he could verify that Andy Warren's commentary concerning Ellis's hat trick was correct.

However, Ellis didn't stop at three. In the second half he became only the second Rovers player to score four goals at home in a League game since Geoff Bradford against Rotherham United in 1959, the other one being Rickie Lambert. Ellis is in good company. Until that day of Harrison Heaven, it is interesting to note that a quartet of goals had been scored more frequently by Rovers players in away

League matches in the last half century. Most recently, Jamie Cureton bagged four against Reading in the Madeiski Massacre in 1999, while Alan Warbovs scored the most fondly remembered foursome of all in the televised 8-2 win at Brighton in 1973. Less celebrated, but equally noteworthy, is the four claimed by Robin Stubbs at Gillingham in 1970, which proves that he shouldn't just be remembered for once being married to Anthea Redfern (kids, ask your Dad).

The joy doesn't end there. Following the exploits of Taylor and Billy Bodin, with hat tricks at MK Dons in October and Coventry City on Boxing Day, Ellis's treble emulated a feat last achieved 83 years ago. You have to go back to the 1933/34 season to locate the last time three different Rovers players scored a hat-trick in the same League campaign, Franklin D. Roosevelt was tackling the Great Depression with customary gusto in the USA, while new German leader Adolf Hitler was just embarking on his attempt to attain global destruction. I'm afraid I couldn't find anyone in the bar who could remember quite that far back!

When Jimmy Smith scored a hat-trick against QPR in April 1934, he became the

third different Rovers player to notch three in a game that season. The previous October, Bob McKay had taken home the matchball - if such customs existed in the Hungry Thirties - after starring against Cardiff City at the ripe old age of 33 years and 42 days. Since then, no older player has scored a League treble for Rovers. The last hat trick scorer over the age of 30 was Bobby Gould, on a memorable debut against Blackburn in 1977.

The first of the three hat tricks in 1933/34 was also achieved by a debutant, Jimmy McCambridge. Can you imagine it: first day of the season, over 25,000 fans packed into Ashton Gate for a Bristol derby, and a new signing scores a hat trick of headers to seal the points with a 3-0 win. I wonder how many of that generation of Rovers fans described it as their best day watching the team before the halcyon days of the Fifties.

Come On You Blues!

A **BIG** TRANSFER WINDOW

ood afternoon ladies and gents and welcome back to The Mem for today's clash with Swindon Town.

Football - it is a horrible game sometimes, isn't it?

In our last fixture here against Northampton Town three weeks ago, we turned in a flawless performance and hammered the Cobblers 5-0. It was a five star showing that demonstrated just what our team are capable of when they are at their best. We looked unplayable in attack (with Ellis Harrison running the show) and absolutely solid as a defensive unit.

Seven days later, though, we travel to Fleetwood Town and completely forget how to defend. Unexplainable individual errors saw us concede three goals to virtually their only three shots on target. In terms of general play we weren't that bad on the day, but we dug our own grave by committing mistakes that most hungover Sunday League players would be ashamed of.

It is hard to understand where this individual errors epidemic has come from. Over the last couple of years our defending has been, in the main, exemplary. This season couldn't be more different, though. We seem absolutely incapable of going 90 minutes away from home without conceding two or three soft goals as a direct result of individual mistakes.

It happened again last weekend at Walsall: three errors, three goals, Never in a month of Sundays was it a 3-1 game, yet we made it that with some kamikaze defending. I felt sorry for debutant goalkeeper Joe Lumley because he performed well but still had to pick the ball out of his net three times. I bet he couldn't believe what was happening.

You can't legislate for individual blunders, which is why I also feel sorry for Darrell Clarke at the moment. We aren't being outplayed by teams, nor do we look like we are going to concede every time the opposition attack. We are comfortable and in control, but somehow proceed to make a howler and gift our opposition a goal. It means that we are always having to chase games.

We can't make the same errors and not learn from them, so the players losing their places in the starting eleven can't really have too many complaints. We have been pretty hamstrung by our incompetencies at the back all season, so the manager has been left with no choice but to dip into the transfer market and recruit players who will hopefully be able to improve things.

It has made January a really big transfer window for us. I was always of the opinion

> that most of our changes in personnel would take place during the summer once the coaching staff had worked out who was up to League One level and who wasn't. That will still be the case I am sure, but our goals against column has been increasing at an alarming rate week on week up to this point so

our hand has been forced. somewhat. We can't afford to sit back and do nothing because we are giving ourselves no chance of claiming any points from away games at the moment.

It is not ideal to have to make key signings in January, especially as the sort of players we will want are under contract at other clubs who won't be keen to let them go, but unfortunately that's exactly what the club have to strive to do.

At the time of writing we have recruited Joe Partington for an undisclosed fee from Eastleigh, the aforementioned Lumley on loan from Queens Park Rangers and Ryan Sweeney on loan from Stoke City. All three come highly rated and I look forward to seeing them in the blue and white quarters, but Clarke said last weekend that another couple of additions are still needed.

Given that both Lumley and Sweeney are loanees, I am hoping those who come through the door next are proven at this level or above. Fasier said than done I know, but those are the type of players I hope we are targeting.

If we haven't completed our business already, it could be an interesting final few days of the window.

Come on Rovers. Come on you Blues!












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MAKE MAKES AN IDOL?


have been thinking a lot recently about what makes an idol, because I have lost one of mine.

I was crushed when George Michael died on Christmas Day. Even writing those words now, reading them back, I feel the grief anew. I only heard the devastating news - and yes, for me, it was devastating - on Boxing Day, as the children were playing with their new toys before we headed off to visit family and watch Rovers.

There have been times when watching Rovers has reduced me to tears, but none were as unrelated to our team as they were on Boxing Day as 'Wake Me Up Before You Go Go'was played over the tannoy. That song encapsulates my earliest childhood: school discos and my girlhood crush on George; I have an exercise book from my infants' school somewhere where I remember writing that when I grew up I would marry him. When a teacher asked me who I wanted to be. I remember answering "Pepsi or Shirlie."

I soon realised his songs were a soundtrack to my entire life. I wrote in my column recently about Rovers being a 'constant' in my life since early teenage days; in comparison, George had been a constant my entire life and I don't recall a time when I did not idolise him.

It was hard to understand when people like Andy



Kershaw made cruel comments in the wake of his passing. And Giles Coren was dumbfounding in his opinion piece of the deaths of famous people in 2016 where he talked of "the pitiful handwringing over a bunch of celebrities who lived fast and died fairly young was deluded codswallop" and talked of "the sort of (weak minded, infantilised) person who falls to pieces when a pop star dies... the talk [afterwards was] the kind of consolatory gibberish you spew to console a child about the death of a pet. Not to an adult about someone they have never met."

Well, Giles, if I am 'weak minded'then let me be. It does not matter that I never met George Michael. His music, his lyrics and his caring, philanthropic nature touched my life in ways that the lives of people have I have known personally have not. He leaves behind a back catalogue of music and memories for me. I feel pity for Mr Coren and

any other person whose own lives have not been touched by an idol.

And for his flaws, his downfalls: I loved George Michael all the more. Wherever my life has taken me, different musical interests, tastes, jobs, where I was living, with whom, George was always there in the background of my life. His lyrics to 'White Light' felt incredibly personal to me. Other songs have always stopped me in my tracks and made me turn up the radio whenever they come on, like 'Careless Whisper' and 1 Knew You Were Waiting For Me! I am appreciative to have been a fan, and forever grateful I got my hands on tickets to see him live in 2007 with my brother Mike as I realised a childhood dream to see him in concert.

He was my idol. It doesn't matter how he died, all that mattered was how he lived.

So I have been thinking of what makes an idol. My husband was a fan of Michel Platini as a child as they shared a birthday, and tried to model his own style of play on him but in later vears this has been tainted by Platini's involvement with FIFA. Other family members I asked came up with several ideas of what an idol should be ('they're only for kids'...'someone you respect because of their faults, as much as for their qualities'... 'someone I've always looked up to with their positive attitude and charity work'... 'someone you respect and admire! Names included fictional character (Biggles, Don Draper), late actors and performers (Audrey Hepburn, Bobby Darin, Cary Grant, Steve McQueen), those who are still with us (from sport: Stuart Pearce, Courtney Walsh), Paul McCartney and Michael Bolton.

I wonder if any of the Rovers squad of today are fans' 'idols'.... someone more than just a favourite player. For me, I have huge affection for Ellis Harrison, as a player, as a character and as the man he has become. He shows a warm gesture of kindness every match to one particular fan which does not go unnoticed.

George Michael's death will not be something I will fathom any time soon. All I know is he was my idol, he was loved and my world is a greater place for having had him in my life.

George: You Have Been Loved.

wo days after joining us, on loan from QPR until the end of the season, goalkeeper Joe Lumley made his Rovers debut at Walsall.

He had a fairly quiet first game and although he had to pick the ball out of the back of his net on three occasions, none of the blame for any of the goals could be laid at his door.

"It was a disappointing beginning to my Rovers career and a disappointing result. I thought we played well in the first half, when we were probably the better side, but we conceded right on the stroke of half time which killed us and then we were punished for two

mistakes in the second half.

"I didn't have that much to do during the game and simply had to clear up from the back and while I didn't have any chance with the first two goals, maybe I could have done better with their third when their player was through in a one on one situation against me.

"On a personal level, though, I did enjoy the experience of playing my first game for the club. The important thing for all of us is that we don't dwell on that result: we have to move on and look forward to the game against Swindon."

His move to BS7 is due, in some ways to his QPR boss lan Holloway.

"I've been looking to get out on loan since the transfer window opened and when the manager told me that he had spoken to Darrell Clarke about a possible move here I was buzzing. 'Ollie' told me that this was his club, that he watched them when he was growing up and went on to play for, and manage, them.

"I'm third choice goalkeeper at OPR, behind Alex Smithies and Matt Ingram who are both in outstanding form and I wanted to come out and play games, do well, and push those two when I go back in the summer and I don't think I could have joined a better club on loan. "I did play a few games for Accrington Stanley, when I was 19, during another loan spell, and I have to say that I found there was a massive difference between reserve team football and playing in League Two. That said, it was a brilliant experience and now I'm looking forward to playing in League One.

"More recently, I've been playing my football in the Development League, but that's nothing compared to playing in the Football League, Development League football is not what I would class as men's football; it's still Academy football, albeit the top level, and it's a game but I don't feel I get anything out of it. >


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
AN INTERVIEW WITH JOE **LUMLEY**

"To be fair, the Academy standard is top drawer but there's nothing on it; if you win it's fine, if you lose it doesn't really matter. In the league, though, it's dog eat dog and everyone is striving to win. Concentration is a key skill, especially for a goalkeeper and I make sure I am focussed in every training session as well as in every match."

He might have only played one game, but he was pretty impressed with the turnout of Gasheads last weekend.

"My Dad and two of my uncles were in amongst the Rovers supporters, who were behind me in the first half. We all thought that the travelling support was unbelievable and





it felt as though there were more Rovers supporters inside the ground than home fans. They were brilliant and kept encouraging me and I can't wait to play at home, now, as I've heard all about the atmosphere at The Mem."

He's grateful to the manager for signing him and for the support he's already received from goalkeeping coach Stuart Naylor.

"Both of them have been superb, as has everyone else. I haven't played many league games, so I'm pleased that Darrell Clarke has placed his

trust in me even though he's taken a little bit of a risk in signing me. I had heard good things about Stuart Naylor from my goalkeeping coach at QPR and he has been brilliant since I arrived."

Speaking of goalkeeping coaches, he may well see a familiar face when Swindon arrive here today; "Dean Thornton, Swindon's current goalkeeping coach, was my youth team goalkeeping coach at OPR and I am still in regular contact with him so I'll be well pleased if I can keep a clean sheet and we win on Saturday!"































































































































































THE ROVERS CONNECTION

ar away from the glare of the Premier League and World Cup qualification, the 2017 African Cup of Nations has begun in Gabon.

This tournament, which started on 14th January, will reach its final in the Stade de l'Amitié in Libreville on 5th February. Believe it or not, there are a number of loosely related Rovers connections.

On this occasion, no Rovers player past or present is taking part. However, striker Junior Agogo, having played over 100 times for Rovers between 2003 and 2006, was in Ghana's squad for the 2008 tournament. Jean-Paul Kalala was in the Democratic Republic of Congo squad in both 2004 and 2006 and was with Rovers in the spring of 2011.

Only one man who has faced Rovers in competitive football has played in an Afcon Final, Max Gradel, who played against The Gas with Bournemouth,

Leicester City and Leeds United, was in the Ivory Coast side which lost to Zambia in a penalty shootout in the 2012 final. Hervé Renard, who managed Zambia to success that day and takes charge of Morocco at the 2017 tournament, was Cambridge United's manager when they played Rovers in October 2004.

There are eight men representing their countries in Afcon this time round, who have also played against Rovers in the Football League, the highest number yet.

Amongst these are Jordan Botaka, in the Democratic Republic of Congo squad, who was in Charlton Athletic's side in both their large victories over Rovers in recent weeks, and also Ghana's Andy Yiadom, who was sent off against Rovers this time last year.

Zimbabwe's Onismor Bhasera, Jacques Maghoma of DRC and Yiadom have all played five times against Rovers, although one of Maghoma's appearances was in the League Cup and two of Yiadom's in the Conference. In February 2011, Orient brought

on both Harry Kane and DRC's Paul-José M'Poku as substitutes against Rovers.

Yiadom for Barnet, Gradel for Leeds United and Northampton Town's Gabriel Zakuani, the last named when Rovers won 3-2 away from home in October this season, have all been sent off in League fixtures against Rovers.

Whilst none on the list has registered a League goal against Rovers, Jacques Maghoma scored for Birmingham City in a League Cup tie at The Mem in August 2015.



REFEREE RAMBLE



ave you ever called a decision during a football match, only to realise having seen replays, that you were wrong?

Shortly after submitting my last entry about the poor refereeing decisions of late and how important I think the inclusion of video technology would be, I listened to a special episode of my favourite podcast 'The Football Ramble' which featured ex-referee Howard Webb

The Football Ramble (@footballramble on Twitter), is a great way to preview and analyse the weekend's football, without being overly serious, whilst actually being rather amusing, Presented by four guys who support Arsenal, Newcastle United, Portsmouth and Hearts. I think

This particular episode with Howard Webb, was presented by Luke Moore (the Portsmouth fan). A superb interview that showed the game from the perspective of the man in the middle.

As the podcast went on, I wondered whether I had been too critical in my previous programme entry, whether I'd slipped back into football fan on the terrace mode, whether my words were just a reaction to Daniel Leadbitter's

incorrect dismissal at Millwall back in November, along with some of the questionable decisions made in recent weeks that have been further highlighted by television broadcast. Had I really considered all angles?

Generally speaking, referees are older than most footballers, some, often twice their age, and yet they are required to be so much fitter. The distance they cover, the speed at which they run, for 90 minutes plus, is often glossed over when hurling abuse at the poor man in the middle for not booking your opponents' centre back as he clipped your advancing centre forward's ankle.

As Luke mentions in the interview, referees are professional athletes and they don't get the respect they deserve. This is further backed up by learning what their fitness test involves.

The first stage of the FIFA Fitness Test for Referees and Assistant Referees involves 6 x 40m sprints, each to be completed in under 6.00 seconds, with a maximum of 60 seconds recovery in between each sprint. If they fail one of the six trials, they are to be given a seventh trial immediately, but if they fail two of the seven, they have failed the test

The job is tough, and that's just the first stage.

Howard Webb starts the podcast by describing how he became a referee. He states how he would have to sacrifice watching his beloved Rotherham United on a Saturday afternoon in order to progress through his career - I know how he feels. Except not refereeing and certainly not Rotherham United.

He started refereeing in the Football League in 2000 before making his Premier League debut three vears later. He understood how much it meant to supporters when a decision didn't go the way of their team and says 'this was professionals, people's lives, you were dealing with. Nice to know a former referee agrees with me on that point, at least...

In my time supporting Bristol Rovers, I've been to a few grounds that could be considered hostile. Unsurprisingly, it's the lower league grounds where the atmosphere is more intimidating, Luke discusses with Howard Webb, (seems disrespectful to just call him Howard, He's refereed a World Cup Final! No offence to Luke Moore of The Football Ramble), whether the intensity of the crowd being on top of you affects your performance.

According to the former man in the middle, you don't get any training on how to officiate in the lower leagues. You learn from your own developments - you learn to block out the abuse, from supporters that scream obscenities at an official for making what they believe is the wrong call - we all know what he means.

Since retiring in 2014, Howard Webb frequents at Rotherham United matches, only to find himself in the stand shouting at the referee over a decision. He says sometimes he has to stop himself and thinks 'what am I doing? I hope he doesn't see me'.

From listening to this excellently constructed podcast, I bought Howard Webb's autobiography -The Man In The Middle - which is just as good to read as the interview was to listen to. (Needless to say, I also own The Football Ramble book.)

It's another side to the game that we love. A side that is always targeted, but never really understood, by the general supporter. Referees are humans. They make mistakes. And as fellow human beings we have to learn to accept that not all decisions will go our way.

That said, I definitely found myself giving the referee at Fleetwood some stick, just a fortnight ago. I guess some things will never change... UTG

FOOTBALL, A FORCE FOR GOOD

ootball, eh? Full of mercenaries, diving cheats, foul mouthed bullies, prima donna poseurs, living lives that bear no resemblance whatsoever to the people who pay their wages.

And the people who pay their wages? Foul mouthed drunks, a screaming, baying pack of animals whose only aim in life is to fight other fans. Is this the football world you recognise? No. Nor me. If we allow the media stereotype image to take hold, we might even believe them. So we mustn't.

There are, and have always been, more positive stories about football, footballers and football fans than there are negatives. However, it's bad news that sells newspapers. We'd much rather read a story about a drunken footballer than a footballer who does something noble, right? Here I present my case for the positive.

Does the name Bradley Lowery ring any bells? He is the five year old Sunderland fan who was diagnosed with neuroblastoma in 2013. £700,000 was raised to enable him to have treatment that might cure him, £200,000 of which was donated by Everton football club.

Tragically, his mother recently revealed that little Bradley will lose his fight.' So what did football do?



Turn its back? Pretend nothing had happened? Count its billions? No. He was carried onto the pitch by Jermain Defoe prior to the Sunderland v Chelsea game, was treated like a king by the likes of Diego Costa, Cesc Fabregas and Gary Cahill and scored a penalty against Chelsea keeper Asmir Begovic which, thanks to BBC Match of the Day, became the Goal of the Month.

Everton made him their mascot a few weeks later and he was again treated like royalty by the Toffees, being doted on by the players in a wonderful show of loyalty and, yes, love. Bradley was carried on to the pitch by Everton striker Romelu Lukaku. Those loveable scousers, eh? And they did it again a few weeks later.

Plymouth fan Kevin May was at Anfield for the Liverpool v Plymouth FA Cup tie when he received a text from his daughter telling him that his son Daniel, 25, had died. Daniel was quadraplegic, blind and had cerebral palsy.

Kevin was devastated. Unable to speak properly at

this terrible news, a police officer took him to a quiet place where he was cared for by Liverpool officials. Then Liverpool fans took things into their own hands, raising money to buy a banner to take to the replay at Home Park, sharing condolences and showing solidarity with the family. In fact, the collection massively exceeded the sum required and the excess had been donated to good causes. You still think football is in a bad place?

Closer to home, look at our own club. Did you see the pictures of our players visiting the Children's Hospice South West? Our red rivals across town have also supported the hospice, proving that love and compassion transcends petty football rivalries and I can give you countless examples of acts of sheer kindness and generosity conducted by Bristol Rovers over many, many years. Not all of these acts make their way into the public gaze because if they did, there would be no room for any other kind of news. And I've got more good news for you today about how you can help.

Between 20th March and 24th March 2017, a hardy bunch of mainly Gasheads will be doing a sponsored walk between Home Park in Plymouth and Bristol Rovers, a distance of some 125 miles. It has been organised by Gashead Mark Brimson whose wife Gloria died tragically a decade

ago following complications during brain surgery. He is looking to raise £10,000 for the Gloria Brimson Foundation to support the excellent Headway charity which provides support services and information to anyone affected by brain injury. I know from speaking to Mark that the club is giving him great support.

Many of you will know Mark who was once a commentator with the brilliant Screen Soccer team who provide top notch coverage and DVDs of Rovers games. As well as being a very successful businessman, Mark is an all round great guy and it is truly inspiring that he has decided to direct his efforts towards helping others after what happened to him. Do you see now? Football is still far more a force for good than bad. There are more positive stories like these than there are bad ones. And you don't have to look very far.

"We were disappointed that we didn't get the rub of the green, but can only have ourselves to blame for letting a two goal lead slip.


"As always it will give us plenty to work on, but there were plenty of positives to take from the game against a strong Swindon team."




Luke Russe had two efforts on goal


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






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FOOTBALL PROGRAMMES AND MEMORABILIA

« THE VALUE AND HISTORY OF FOOTBALL MEMORABILIA THAT HAVE SOLD AT AUCTION AND ELSEWHERE »



The primary item in this lot was the 1969 booklet relating to Swindon's League Cup Final match against Arsenal, which Swindon won 3-1, autographed inside on pen pictures and central page colour team group by approximately 30 players and staff. Also included was 'Meet the Sports Stars' about Don Rogers, the hero that day, autographed by him on the front cover plus the programme for the Don Rogers Testimonial match v. West Bromwich Albion on 5th May 1978, with teams written in. Estimated at £45-50, the lot sold for £55.



After three impressive away victories in the FA Cup qualifying rounds - at King's Lynn (2-0), Chatteris Town (6-1), Chelmsford City (4-0) Cambridge Town were drawn away again in the first round proper and this time succumbed, losing 4-1 to Swindon in this match played on 30th November 1946. Estimate £15-25, sold for £15.

Swindon Town v. Chelsea

Three Swindon v. Chelsea programmes, all from matches at the County Ground. Two were single sheet reserve matches that took place on 9th November 1957 (team changes, fold, a little marked) and 25th September 1963. The other, dated 13th May 1985 was from a League Cup tie and had a fold. Described overall as 'Generally

> good' condition the estimate was £25-35, eventually selling for £35.

Postcard of Swindon Town Team Group

This postcard is part of the Health and Strength Series, published in the first decade of the twentieth century and shows, three trophies in front of the team. Formerly the

property of a player, with a note to that effect, also described as 'Generally good' but failed to sell despite a reasonable estimate of £45-50.

Swindon Town v. **Torquay United**

Quite rare Swindon home programme for the match against Torquay played on 12th October 1929, the description stated it had rusty staple marks in the spine area on most pages and was 'Fair-generally good'. The estimate of £110-120 was bang on and the programme was sold at the higher figure.

Bristol Rovers Subbuteo Team

Selling on a well known auction site recently was this Subbuteo 'heavyweight' team from the early 1970s. Described as 'Bristol Rovers Ref No 12, in

very good condition, with one man shorter than the others'! The accompanying box was said to be in excellent condition. Listed at a starting price of £12.50, it sold for £18.

Leeds United v. Bristol Rovers

This programme for the match played on 10th October 1953, was described as being in 'good condition. The estimate of £15-20 was exceeded as it sold for £20.

fortnight ago the Robins chalked up their first win since November with an impressive performance at Bolton.

Their 2-1 victory at the Macron Stadium followed the arrival of four loan signings including former Rovers' loanee CHARLIE COLKETT.

BEN GLADWIN, on loan from QPR, is no stranger to the County Ground having originally joined the Robins from non league Marlow in the summer of 2013. The winger, now 24, arrived at Loftus Road two years later and has since had two loan spells at Swindon in addition to a month on loan at Bristol City early last year.

GLADWIN was followed by three loanees from Chelsea, COLKETT, England U-20 defender FANKATY DABO and Somalian striker ISLAM FERUZ.

COLKETT, whose last game on loan for the Pirates was in last month's defeat at Shrewsbury, made a total of 17 appearances on loan for Rovers, scoring three times in the process. He captained Chelsea's youth side in last season's successful UEFA Youth League campaign. DABO, who made his League debut against the Trotters, is an England U-20 international while FERUZ. 21, has made substitute appearances on loan for Blackpool and Hibs. All four played in the Robins' win at Bolton in which GLADWIN scored their first goal. Iragi international YASER KASIM, whose winning goal there was his second strike of the season, came to these shores at the age of six and signed for

Brighton in August 2010 after spells as a youth with Fulham and Tottenham. He played on loan for Luton and Macclesfield before joining the Robins in the summer of 2013 and has since made over 130 senior appearances.

Summer 2016 signing LUKE NORRIS joined Brentford on a two year scholarship in the summer of 2010 and made his senior debut for the Bees in April the following year at the age of 17. Loan spells took him to Northampton and Dagenham & Redbridge ahead of a move to Gillingham in the 2014 close season which kept him at Priestfield for the next two campaigns. NORRIS netted for the third time this term in the Robins' pre Christmas home draw with Fleetwood.

JERMAINE HYLTON returned in December from a loan spell at National League side Guiseley. The 23 year old striker signed for the Robins in January 2015 from Southern League Redditch after netting 45 times in two seasons.

Northern Ireland U-21 international JORDAN STEWART, who can play in midfield or up front, left Glentoran to join Swindon in the summer of 2015. STEWART, who ended last season on loan at Grimsby, netted at OPR in the EFL Cup in August. He returned to play in a development team fixture against Rovers earlier this month having been out of action since November and undergoing knee surgery. He returned to the Robins' senior side against Peterborough last week when he stepped off the bench with 15 minutes remaining.

Striker JONATHAN OBIKA, now 26, is a former Tottenham trainee who signed for Town in September 2014 after loan experience at Yeovil, Millwall, Crystal Palace, Peterborough, Charlton and Brighton as well as at the County Ground. The ex England U-20 cap found the net for the third time this term in November's draw at Southend.

ELLIS IANDOLO, 19, who was

ELLIS IANDOLO, 19, who was released by Gillingham in 2012, made his debut for the Robins in September 2015 at Newport in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy. He scored in Swindon's Checkatrade Trophy defeat at Luton in December.

Summer 2016 signing CONOR THOMAS was one of nine players released by Coventry last May. The former England U-18 international midfielder, now 23, rose through the Sky Blues' Academy ranks to make 117 senior appearances for them in six years. A hamstring problem prevented him from playing for Liverpool, whom he joined on loan in January 2011.

After his release from Brighton's Academy, 24 year old ANTON RODGERS made one substitute appearance for the Seagulls, in a FA Cup tie against Wrexham. The son of Celtic boss Brendan, the former Republic of Ireland U-19 cap switched to Swindon in the summer of 2014 after a season at Oldham in which he played 14 games for the Latics

JOHN GODDARD's 20 goals for Woking last season earned him the club's 'Player of the Year' award. The former England 'C' international, now 23, joined Reading at the age of eight. After leaving the Royals in the summer of 2012 he spent a season with Hayes and Yeading and switched to the County Ground last May after leaving the Cards.

JAMES BROPHY stepped up from non league football to sign for the Robins in August 2015 after a trial period. The 22 year old had previously turned out for Broadfields United and Edgware Town. 18 year old Academy graduate TOM **SMITH** signed a professional deal in the summer of 2014 and made his senior debut as a second half substitute at Preston in April 2015. Former scholar JAKE EVANS, also 18, has been with the club from the age of ten. He made his first senior appearance towards the end of last season's final game, a 3-0 home win against Shrewsbury. Ex Republic of Ireland U-21 cap SEAN MURRAY, an August 2016 acquisition from Watford, was part of the Hornets' youth system before signing a professional deal in 2012. He scored 14 goals in 84 outings and netted once in eight games for Wigan on loan last term.

LLOYD JONES, 21, on loan from Liverpool, was born in Plymouth and spent five years in the Argyle Centre of Excellence before Liverpool came calling in May 2011. The England U-20 cap previously played for Wales, for whom he qualified thanks to his father, at U-17 and U-19 levels. He turned out on loan for Cheltenham,



OSSIE ARDILES

Former Argentina international midfielder Ossie Ardiles made two League appearances for Swindon Town in 1989/90. Together with Ricky Villa, the World Cup winner made headlines with his transfer from Huracan to Spurs in July 1978. He helped win the FA Cup in 1981 and UEFA Cup in 1984, moving to QPR in May 1988. Appointed Swindon's player/boss in July 1989, he plotted their 1989/90 Second Division play off final success but they were denied promotion due to an illegal payments scandal. He took charge of Newcastle United in March 1991, then managed West Brom and Spurs before coaching overseas.

MIKE SUMMERBEE

Brilliant winger Mike Summerbee was capped eight times by England after leaving Swindon Town. Initially with Cheltenham Town, he moved to the County



Ground in March 1960 and was an important figure in Swindon's 1962/63 promotion success. He netted 39 goals in 218 League games prior to joining Manchester City in August 1965, amassing a vast collection of domestic and European honours under the Joe Mercer/Malcolm Allison partnership at Maine Road, Later playing for Burnley, Blackpool and Stockport County, he became a successful businessman and his son Nicky also starred for Swindon Town.

GLENN HODDLE

Ex England international midfielder Glenn Hoddle was player-manager as Swindon Town reached the Premiership in 1992-93. Signing professional for Tottenham Hotspur in April 1975, he starred as they won promotion

in 1977/78. then won the FA Cup in two consecutive seasons and the UFFA Cup in 1984. He moved to Monaco in July 1987 and helped win the French title in 1987/88, becoming

Swindon's player/boss in August 1991. Scoring once in 64 League games for the Robins, he left to take charge of Chelsea after the 1992/93 play off final triumph and later managed England, Southampton, Spurs and Wolves.



PAUL INCE

Midfielder Paul Ince gained 53 England caps before playing for Swindon Town, Initially with West Ham, he moved to Manchester United for £1,000,000 in September 1989 and was England's first black captain. He amassed numerous honours. including

the 'double' in 1993/94. joining Inter Milan for £8,000,000 in July 1995, Later with Liverpool, Middlesbrough and Wolves, he joined Swindon in August 2006 and made three League appearances while at the County Ground, He became Macclesfield Town's player/boss in January 2007 and has since managed MK Dons, Blackburn, MK Dons again, Notts County and Blackpool.



FRANK MCAVENNIE


Former Scotland international striker Frank McAvennie had a loan spell at Swindon Town in 1993/94. He starred for

St Mirren before joining West Ham in June 1985 and was top scorer as they were third in the top flight in 1985/86. Moving to Celtic in October 1987, he scored twice in their

1988 Scottish Cup final triumph and rejoined West Ham in March 1989. He helped win promotion in 1990/91, moving to Aston Villa in August 1992, then

Celtic again. Loaned to Swindon in February 1994, he made seven League appearances before rejoining St Mirren, His colourful life story is titled 'Scoring -An Expert's Guide'.

ard to believe, but Swindon Town's last visit to The Mem was on 10th December 2011 and this afternoon we take a quick look back at how Rovers were making the news in the week leading up to that game.

The previous Sunday had seen Rovers in live TV action as they took on AFC Totton in the second round of the FA Cup and they passed their test with flying colours, winning 6-1 against the non league outfit.

The draw for the third round, made immediately after that match, gave Rovers a home tie against Aston Villa, and the Monday papers were focussed on that match rather than the next league fixture!

Chairman Nick Higgs said that he hoped the TV

cameras would be at The Mem to cover the Villa game: "Villa won't want to come to a full Memorial Stadium with the majority of fans baying for us to win. If the TV Cameras don't come it will be their loss, because we will be putting on a show."

Manager Buckle added; "It's a cracking draw. The first thing you want is a Premier League club and the chance to play them at home will be great and brings a smile to my face!"

Goalkeeper Scott Bevan, at least, was focussed on league form and said; "We have a big home game against Swindon Town on Saturday and now we have to try to get on a roll and start pushing up the league."

Meanwhile Eliot Richards was hoping that after scoring twice in the FA Cup he would be selected for the Swindon game. He

had, in fact, made a little bit of history in that he became the first Rovers substitute to score a double in an FA Cup tie; "I just have to keep proving myself, get in the gaffer's thoughts and hopefully get a place in the starting eleven."

While Buckle was still prattling on about the Villa game, Chris Zebroski. born and raised in Swindon and who played for the club from the age of 10 through to 16, was looking forward to facing his hometown club; "They are on a good unbeaten run, so they are high on confidence. But it's been a good week for us and a win against Swindon would top it off."

It didn't quite happen as the sides drew 1-1, with Danny Woodards on target for Rovers and Paul Caddis for The Robins.

JEFFREY EDWARD HUGHES

A trainee engineer with one goal in 47 Irish League games for Larne, 'The Harbour Rats', under his belt, tall midfielder Jeff Hughes made his League bow as a last minute substitute at The Mem, when Lincoln drew 0-0 with Rovers in September 2005.

He was to enjoy a degree of success with the Imps, scoring twice in their 7-1 win against Rochdale in October 2006 and scoring in both legs of the play off semi finals against Rovers in May 2007.

Consistent club form earned a couple of full caps for Northern Ireland, Hughes playing against Uruguay in New Jersey and Rumania in Chicago at the end of July 2006. Red booted Hughes found Palace, lost



Hughes scored against Carlisle on his Notts County début after just 13 minutes,






but his form was insufficient to prevent County missing out on the play offs in 2011/12 on goal difference and, having scored in three of his first four League games for the Cod Army, he subsequently played for Fleetwood against Rovers in October 2013 and Cambridge United against Rovers in October 2015.

He scored once in 18 Conference matches with Tranmere, one of three last minute goals in a 4-3 win at Barrow in January 2016 and since joining them permanently last summer, has scored twice in 22 games for the National League outfit.

THIS DAY

28TH JANUARY

etween 1883 and 1888, Bill Braund, a founder member of the Black Arabs who was born on this day, 28th January 1865 in Bedminster, is known to have played at right half in 17 games, aithough the full figure from unreported fixtures may well be significantly higher.

He also refereed Eastville Rovers' game at Warmley over Easter 1886. Honorary secretary for the inaugural season, 1883/84, whilst living at 10 Frenchay Terrace, he later lived in City Road, Lower Ashley Road and Ashley Hill and was at 152 Richmond Road, Montpelier for much of his adult life.

The second of eight sons to George Braund (1839-1904), a journeyman brush maker, and Elizabeth 1920), Bill Braund married Linda Maria Pow (1871-1970),

who lived to the age of 98, in Bristol in 1894. They had two children, Marion Elizabeth (born in 1897), who married Henry Leigh (1901-62), and Herbert (1895-1952), and they lived at 31 Balmoral Road, St Andrew's Park.

Having taught at Mina Road School (1888-93), Anglesea Place School (1893-1900) and Russell Town School for five years, he was from 1905 to January 1928 Headmaster of Barleyfields Board School, Horton and was from 1904 President of the Bristol and District branch of the National Union of


In 1920 he helped form the Bristol and District Inter Club Billiards championship and was regional secretary for the National Billiards Association.

He died in Bristol in 1955, aged 90.

LOOKING BACK

" PART ONE OF MIKE JAY'S LOOK BACK AT SEASON 2012/13"

nder manager Mark McGhee Rovers struggled to find success though the autumn of 2012. crushing defeats at Gillingham, Port Vale and York City leaving the club rooted to the foot of the Football League at Christmas, before manager John Ward returned for a second spell.



Ward made a number of astute signings and restored the players' self belief. An astonishing run then took the club within shouting distance of an unexpected play off berth. Spring success enabled Rovers, despite not winning any of their final four fixtures, to complete their second campaign back in the basement division in fourteenth place.

Undefeated at home in 2012, Rovers approached the new season with realistic optimism. McGhee brought in Seanan Clucas, goalkeeper Sam Walker on loan and former Bristol City player David Clarkson who all made their club débuts at Ipswich in the League Cup. Garry Kenneth, a veteran of two Scottish Cup Finals at Dundee United, was ruled out initially following a calf injury sustained whilst warming up for his début at Barnet; Neil Etheridge, a Filipino international, was an efficient goalkeeper; Derek Riordan, the third highest scorer in the Scottish Premier League, played poorly for the club before returning goalless to Scotland; Tom Eaves proved a useful loan signing in a struggling side and squad member Fabian Broghammer, a German midfielder, soon accrued popular status amongst the Rovers following.

However, illusions were swiftly shattered as the club's unbeaten home record under McGhee crumbled 2-0 against Oxford, the visitors bringing 1,019 supporters for the opening day fixture. A fortnight later, Rovers dropped into the relegation zone when the second home fixture was lost 3-0 to Morecambe. Suddenly, from

the jaws of a potential promotion campaign, Rovers were clutching at the ashes of a proposed relegation dogfight.

Three goals behind by half time at champions Gillingham, Rovers crumbled 4-0. Defeat at Vale Park by the same score, Rovers taking just 132 hardy supporters, included a hat trick by Tom Pope. Three goals were conceded in 14 first half minutes at Wimbledon, and four in a disastrous 20 minutes before half time at York. Rovers were, in December, the only side in the division to have received six red cards, both Eliot Richards and Kenneth being dismissed in the defeat at Rochdale.

The side only managed a point after three times taking the lead at home to Bradford City and only 1,794 fans turned up when Rovers visited Barnet. When the first victory appeared on the cards, Rovers' game at Wycombe was controversially abandoned after 63 minutes; leading 3-1 in a storm with Richards having registered a brace, Rovers found the game called off not by the referee or the police, but the Health and Safety Officer and, when the fixture was replayed. crashed to a 2-0 defeat with Matt Lund being sent off. The subsequent

irony of Rovers' victory at Wycombe in April 2014 which ensured Rovers' League safety and all but relegated Wanderers to Conference football was not lost on Rovers' supporters.

More than this, Rovers appeared to be having a very poor run with injuries. Top scorer from 2011/12 Harrold had contributed just one goal when he suffered a cruciate ligament injury at Gillingham and Kenneth also underwent knee surgery. In addition to this, Matt Gill, Scott Bevan and Adam Virgo were long term absentees with injury. Dan Woodards also suffered a cruciate knee injury in April which threatened to keep him out of football for nine months.

Despite the early season poor results, Rovers contrived to pick up four points from their two September trips to Devon, victory at Exeter paving the way to a League double, though former Rovers striker Jamie Cureton, aged 37, became the 17th oldest opponent to register a League goal against the club. Before injury took its toll, new signing Clarkson proved he had an eye for goal and Lee Brown also indicated he was reliable from the penalty spot; his tally included a twice taken effort at Oxford.

A morale boosting 3-1 home victory over Northampton in October featured first goals for the club for Eaves, Man of the Match Kenneth and young Oli Norburn; Eaves, impressively scoring seven times to become the club's seasonal highest scorer despite the side's failings around him, added two goals as ten man Torquay United were defeated 3-2. When Rovers staged a November book signing of Geoff Bradford's long awaited biography, pleasingly against his namesake club Bradford City, loanee central defender Guy Branston scored after 79 seconds with his first touch in a quartered shirt.



1998 -**ROVERS HOLD** IPSWICH

Peter Beadle's first half strike gave the following Bristol Rovers team a 1-1 FA Cup third round draw with Ipswich Town in stormy conditions at the Memorial Stadium on 3rd January 1998: Andy Collett, David Pritchard, Matt Lockwood, Gary Penrice, Tom White, Steve Foster, Ian Holloway, Tom Ramasut (Frankie Bennett), Peter Beadle, Jamie Cureton, Barry Hayles. Ipswich, including former Rovers midfielder Geraint Williams, equalised through Mick Stockwell in the second half. David Johnson's goal shortly before half time gave Ipswich a narrow 1-0 victory over lan Holloway's side in the replay at Portman Road ten days later.

1999 -CURETON STUNS ROYALS

Jamie Cureton scored four goals as the following Bristol Rovers team gained an amazing 6-0 Second Division victory over Reading in the new Madeiski Stadium on 16th January 1999: Lee Jones, Stephane Leoni, Trevor Challis, Rob Trees. Steve Foster, Andy Thomson. lan Holloway, David Lee, Mark McKeever, Jamie Cureton, Jason Roberts. Goalless at half time, the irrepressible Cureton scored the first four in 21 minutes, while Jason Roberts added two goals in the last two minutes. Rovers netted ten goals against Reading that season, winning 4-1 at home five months earlier, a figure only previously achieved against Doncaster Rovers in 1956/57.





2002 -ELLINGTON SLAUGHTERS RAMS

Nathan Ellington grabbed a hat trick as the following Bristol Rovers team gained a stunning 3-1 FA Cup third round victory over top-flight Derby County in front of 18,549 at Pride Park on 6th January 2002: Scott Howie, Mark Smith, Trevor Challis, Mark Foran, Che. Wilson, Mike Trought, David Hillier, Lewis Hogg, Sergio Ommel, Nathan Ellington, Kevin Gall (Mark Walters). It was one of three hat tricks scored by Ellington in

less than a month. Derby's late consolation goal was netted by Fabrizio Ravanelli. Third Division Rovers' only previous FA Cup win away to top flight opposition was the 3-2 third round victory at Burnley in 1957/58.


2011 -ROVERS **ROCK ROBINS**

Leading marksman Will Hoskins, Jo Kuffour and Jeff Hughes scored to give the following Bristol Rovers team a 3-1 League One victory over fellow strugglers Swindon Town at the Memorial Stadium on 22nd January 2011: Luke Daniels, Carl Regan, Gary Sawyer, Stuart Campbell,

Dave McCracken, Byron Anthony, Ben Swallow, Chris Lines, Will Hoskins, Jo Kuffour, Jeff Hughes. It was Rovers' first win in 13 League matches and first under new manager Dave Penney but they crashed to a 6-1 defeat at Walsall a week later. Rovers lost all except one of their next nine matches and were relegated, together with Swindon, at the end of the season.



2014 -SEVERNSIDE SUCCESS

Lowly Bristol Rovers gained a 3-1 League Two win at home to Newport County on 25th January 2014. Kaid Mohamed, on loan from Port Vale, missed a good chance before giving Rovers the lead on 45 minutes. An Ollie Clarke shot was deflected and Mohamed reacted quickly to break the deadlock, Rovers went further ahead after 48 minutes when Eliot Richards ghosted past former Rovers player Andy Sandell to score. Newport reduced the deficit on 57 minutes when former Rovers loanee Rene Howe netted from Ryan Burge's pass. Lee Minshull hit the post for Newport before John Joe O'Toole completed the win on 90 minutes by scoring from 20 yards.

s the preceding article in this series made reference to the regarding the work of Joseph Daveridge and Thomas Bowden, it would now seem opportune to explore their work in greater detail.

Given that both of these early soccer historians were products of the Victorian educational system, it is of little surprise to find their enterprises recorded in almost identical copperplate handwriting, but where they occasionally differ is in regard to goalscorers.

Originally, it was thought that this was due to Daveridge's extra knowledge in consequence being a director of Bristol City Football Club, but the fact that he often fails to record games played at Christmas and Easter, suggests it is more likely a consequence of his choice of newspaper (the Tory Bristol Times & Mirror for many years not

covering such games, whilst the Liberal supporting Western Daily Press had no such scruples)

The writer of this article first had knowledge of Bowden's research when visiting Bill Pinnell (The Traveller) at his Greenmore Road home in Knowle, in October 1964, but it was to be quite some time before this work could be examined in greater detail. February 1980 in fact when Peter Godsiff (Bristol Evening Post),

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who had been bequeathed much of Pinnell's football records, kindly allowed him to borrow Bowden's three volume (1897-1902; 1902-1910; 1910-1915) work. However, many more years passed that, thanks to Gerry Pearce of Downend, acquaintance was made in regard to the labours of Daveridge, of which a page from the 1899/1900 season is reproduced below.

Apart from the 1897/98 campaign, Bowden's layout is strikingly similar to that of Daveridge. For example the 1898/99 season, which covered the Southern League, United League, and the Western League, consisted of 35 pages starting with a grid giving the date and result of all the matches played; then an individual listing of all of these results in date order;

followed by individual charts for each club fully detailing their record; all of City's results; a month by month breakdown of City's players appearances; a listing of all of City's lineups, including goalscorers and referee; and finally analysis

charts for City in each competition (League, FA Cup, Friendlies).

The amount of detail is truly amazing, Bowden even going so far as to frequently

add references to the referee, such as describing EG McDonald as unfair, duffer on 31st December 1898, but perhaps, in this instance, Bowden was influenced by the fact that Rovers won this friendly 3-2 at St John's Lane. It is a pity though, that neither Daveridge nor Bowden saw fit to include any attendance or receipt details in their work.


Quite why Bowden, who lived at 9 Wick Road, Brislington, didn't carry on with his record keeping after 1915 is not known, but it is to be hoped that he wasn't a casualty in the madness that engulfed humankind at this time.

Leaving such depressing thoughts aside, however, it is to be hoped that the following couple of photocopied pages from the 1900/01 season, which includes details of some of the Rovers games, will serve to allow others to appreciate the pioneering efforts of Bowden's industry.

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DEMONS AND **DEFENDERS**

eternal cold is the new way forward for bad folk - like Bristol City supporters.

I've never felt anything like it. I thought my fingers were going to fall off. No. Not frostbite. I was shivering and shaking and almost fingerless - thanks to my hand in my mouth - because Walsall had just found the back of the net for the third time and the sheer terror of flashbacks to Charlton and Shrewsbury hit me like an iceberg.

It wasn't the prettiest of away games. Then again how could it be? It was a

hypothermic second half humping which saw many supporters depart the Banks' Stadium immediately after their Joe left our Byron looking like Bambi on ice to put number three past our own Joel

I was absolutely mortified! No. Not because Byron had turned into Bambi on ice - but because I thought we stayed 'til the end? Apparently not! But then I thought about it afterwards in the car on our way home. It was a freezing day. Maybe the frozen tears of anguish which filled the eyes


of many of our travelling blue and white faithful had sealed eyelids shut in the 73rd minute - thus seeing the nearby A&E Dept invaded by snow blind Gasheads in the 80th minute? Or maybe not!

One thing I will say though - is our car journey back from away games has now become hugely entertaining. And to be honest -I'm kind of looking forward to losing the next away match we go to. The post match analysis is so much better when it's delivered by four irate supporters whose viewpoints are inspired by nothing less than out and out fury.

Don't get me wrong - it's an incredible feeling returning from an on the road win. But the journey back to Bristol seems to be one of serenity and smug smiles. Horror is much more fun. On Saturday - just as I was joining the M5 from the M6 - I heard an outburst of expletive savagery from the back seat which seemed to last an eternity and pretty much guarantees the soul from whence it came an eternal penance with the aforementioned City supporters in a hellish icebox

It was madness but it was a delightful dementedness and I'm hoping to record something similar during our return from Rochdale next Saturday. I reckon I could sell the recording to Hollywood for the next new Exorcist movie. But in all seriousness (don't worry - I'm not about to suggest DC gets a priest in to vanguish our away demons) I do think DC should get a priest in to vanguish our away demons. It's gone too far now. And to be truthful - I don't think the man of the cloth will have trouble in casting out the unholy entity. Based on its presence away from the Mem - it's unlikely it'll be able to defend itself

Speaking of 'the possessed' - Swindon visit us today. The last time I saw them was in August during that biblical flood. Five thousand of them. So how come I counted ten thousand heads? UTG!

The Manchester United No 9 has again linked with former Inter Milan Manager Jose Mourinho on a free transfer from Paris Saint-Germain, he is an incredible talent and at 35 years of age what makes him the legend he has become?

In 2012 Zlatan then made a switch to Paris Sant-Germain where he played 122 games scoring 113 goals.

In Summary, an fascinating film that gives insight into a genius who has been absolute class offset against where on occasion he has suffered 'on the field' with discipline issues.

IN CONVERSATION WITH 'MOI-MEME'...

ood afternoon and welcome to the Memorial Stadium for the 29th game of Bristol Rovers' 2016/2017 campaign as we host Swindon Town.

With today's visitors currently sitting in 19th place in League One, Darrell Clarke will be looking to his side to continue this season's impressive home form. With the spice of a local derby and the woes of a poor run of away form, Rovers have the perfect opportunity to bounce back and reignite their promotion aspirations.

Just a week before the January transfer window closes and 18 games to completion of the current season, DC continues to set his plans in motion as the playing side of the club moves into a transitional phase.

I am a personal fan of the way Darrell conducts himself with on and off the pitch business. He is very loyal to his players and strikes an excellent balance between what needs keeping in the dressing room and how he communicates information to the press and fans.

The manager is very fair and puts an honest onus on the players who are given every opportunity to show they are capable of performing regularly at the required level. Although close to the players, he doesn't let them rest on their laurels. During his time at the helm, we have seen him regularly offer year deals to players with the promise of renewal should they fulfil their obligations to set playing targets.

Thinking it through, I'm not really surprised by any of them, even Jermaine Easter, Great servants for the club and top class professionals, I don't see Will Puddy, Mark McChrystal or Liam Lawrence producing the required consistency as the Gas move forward with performance based targets. Jake Gosling has departed on loan to Forest Green Rovers and with his contract expiring at the end of the season, his career in blue and white quarters appears to be all but over.

As a club we are comparable to the exploits of other teams in recent years. Swansea City now



play in the Premier League having risen through the divisions with a core nucleus of players. The same can be said about AFC Bournemouth. brilliantly guided by Eddie Howe. Both teams stuck with players they believed could do a job at the required level and that trust and stability paid off, MK Dons are another club to have enjoyed a lot of success with the same approach under the guidance of Karl Robinson until their relegation to League One last season.

So, what can be expect changewise? 21 year old Joe Lumley's arrival from QPR has offered a solution to the goalkeeping dilemma and 19 year old Ryan Sweeney has made the loan move from Stoke City to feel a void in the Gas central defence. Matty Taylor's future is always the focus of transfer column gossip and it's difficult to envisage keeping his services should the club not be aspiring to securing

a third consecutive promotion, Should Rovers succeed in staving off interest from higher level suitors, I would expect Matty to move on this summer should Rovers not be plying their trade in the Championship. Two or three further additions are expected between now and Transfer Deadline Day (end of January).

Every Gashead has a right to an opinion, but there is some negativity at this moment in time. I accept negativity as long as logical justification can be given. The fact is we are a club that have secured back to back promotions and expectations are simply not realistic in some 'quarters' as to what we are achieving. The training ground project continues to gather momentum and the UWE Stadium is also progressing behind the scenes. The future's bright, the future's blue and white!

IT MIGHT HAVE BEEN HUDDERSFIELD

s our fixture today against Swindon is set to go ahead, that means one sure thing.

We are both out of the FA Cup...

For 32 other teams, including two from non league, a game will have to be moved to a midweek slot. For our near neighbours, it means that their fans get to travel to Birmingham one evening, to face improving Aston Villa. Their miserable run of eight straight League defeats has probably not been noticed by many of our fans, but it will stay as just that for now. They have a daunting Cup trip to Premier League side Burnley to tackle instead.

Our second round exit to Barrow was embarrassing. but our visitors today also crashed out at home to non League opposition, in the quise of ambitious Eastleigh. Their fate was sealed in round one. following a replay.

For anyone who follows the draw thread and ignores ball numbers, Barrow crashed out to League One Rochdale in round three. Their third round crowd of 4,414 was at least a tonic. Rochdale must feel that they have a chance of overcoming round four visitors Huddersfield Town,

who will make an unusual trip across the moors to visit them, this afternoon.

Working on the same premise as above, today would see Swindon on a far more glamorous (and expensive) trip to Chelsea. Eastleigh went on to beat fellow National League side Halifax, but were then trounced by Championship side Brentford, who now travel to Stamford Bridge.

My most recent memories of round four weekend, are still just under 10 years ago. On 26th January 2008, we travelled at very short notice to Barnet's Underhill. Round three had been a real saga. We'd drawn on a Sunday (2-2), at Craven Cottage, home of then Premier League side Fulham and brought them back to the Memorial Stadium.

Mid January that year

was very damp, and eventually, the game took place in the midweek, before round four Saturday. We won on penalties, after extra

time and only found that night, that we'd face Barnet, (not today's opponents Swindon). Bizarrely, Barnet had pipped Swindon on penalties too, on the same night.

Notwithstanding both our early Cup exits this season to non league opposition, last week saw even more success for National League sides. Sutton United must have licked their lips when they drew AFC Wimbledon from up the road, in round three, After a draw at home, they were pinching themselves last week when they won the replay 3-1. They now have a mouthwatering fourth round tie against Leeds United coming up.

It still seems strange to call Lincoln City a non league side, but after over five years at National League at level, they are now leading

the table and looking likely to return to the Football League. Crowds have climbed up over 5,000 and despite the obvious need to maintain League form, a strong FA Cup run is ongoing too.

They started out in the fourth qualifying round against fellow National League side Guiseley and after dispatching them, moved on past Altrincham and League One Oldham Athletic. Their third round reward was a daunting trip to Championship Ipswich Town, A draw at Portman Road saw them take the Tractor Boys back to Sincil Bank for a money spinning BBC televised replay last week.

An added time winner sent a full house into ecstasy, final score 1-0. They now have another home tie against another Championship side, Brighton & Hove Albion. It must have been the biggest night at Sincil Bank since 2007, when a certain team beat them 5-3, in a League Two play off second lea game.






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AN INTERVIEW WITH

JOE PARTINGTON

efender Joe Partington was the first of four (at the time of writing) new players to arrive at the club this month after agreeing to move to us from Eastleigh.

"It feels as though a lot has happened in a such a short space of time, what with the two games we've played and a couple of weeks of training, but I feel comfortable around the boys and everyone, from the management team, the players and the staff, have made me feel welcome. The training has been really good and I've enjoyed everything about the club so far.

"With three more players

coming in after me, I'm no longer the new boy. Those three have got their initiation song to get out of the way on our next overnight stay and, having done mine. I'll be able to sit back and relax and watch them perform!"

His debut, as a second half substitute, at Fleetwood ended disappointingly as we were beaten 3-1; "It was a difficult game to go on in, though on a personal level it was nice to be on the pitch and to be involved so soon after signing, but I think I could have performed better than I did on the day."




MUSICAL CONNECTIONS – SWINDON

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

ost football fans have, at one time or another, picked their 'dream team' – a side made up of their footballing heroes.

Today's Double Bubble guest, former Rovers and Swindon Town defender Richard Dryden, could pick the nucleus of his own dream team, based on managers that he's played for. "If you could put Bobby Gould, Gerry Francis, Terry Cooper, Joe Jordan, Graeme Souness, Glen Hoddle, Peter Shilton and John McGovern in the same line up, you'd be well on the way to having a pretty good side," he pointed out.

Watched playing youth football in Stroud by Rovers legend Harold Jarman, Richard joined the Pirates on a one year youth training scheme. He would make his debut in a 2-1 win at Brentford as a 17 year old, going on to have two years as a full time pro with Rovers. His 20th and last appearance came in a 1-1 draw at Bolton in September 1988. "I moved on to Exeter City, managed by Terry Cooper. Apart from my Mum and Dad, he was, without doubt, the single biggest influence on my career," Richard told me. He would make 105 appearances for the Grecians, enjoyed a loan spell with Manchester City, before joining Neil Warnock's Notts County.

Richard spent two years with County, during which time, he went to Plymouth Argyle on loan to get match fit after injury. "Shilton and McGovern were the management team there at the time and you can only have respect for what they achieved as players," he said.

In March 1993, the chance to link up again with Terry Cooper at Birmingham was too good to turn down. "There were lots of good reasons to go to Birmingham, Terry (Cooper) not being the least of them." After half a hundred or so games for Brum, Richard moved back to Bristol, signing for Rovers' arch enemies, City, managed by Joe Jordan. "It was great to be back in Bristol but I have to say, it wasn't the best time of my career," admitted Richard.

Richard played 45 games for the Robins between 1994 and 1996, and when he did leave Ashton, it was to move back to the top flight with Southampton. His five years there though were blighted by a serious knee injury, which restricted him to around 50 games.


"I went out on loan to try and get match fit and had spells at Stoke, Northampton and (today's visitors) Swindon Town," said Richard, who made the worse possible start at Swindon by scoring an OG on his debut. He did enjoy winning success in his next two games, but finished his loan spell of just a handful of games with a 1-0 defeat at Port Vale in January 2001.

After leaving the Saints,
Richard signed for Luton
Town – manager Lil Fuccillo's
last signing. "He signed me
on the Thursday, our game was
postponed on the Saturday and he
was sacked the following Monday but don't blame me!"

In the Summer of 2002, Richard left league football for non league

Scarborough, then managed by current Coventry City manager Russell Slade. He moved on to Worksop Town and then had two and a half years as assistant to former team mate Mark Cooper, who was managing Tamworth. Further moves saw him join Shepshed Dynamo, manage Worcester City, rejoin Mark Cooper as his assistant at Darlington and take on a Head of Youth coaching role at York City. He linked up again with Cooper Junior at Notts County, before moving overseas last Summer to experience the Indian League as assistant coach with East Bengal.

he gleaming Jules Rimet Trophy rises from the centre of the pitch at Everton's Goodison Park on the cover of this January 1966 edition and a venue for several group matches in the forthcoming World Cup finals comprising of just 16 nations, not like the expanded 48 that will compete in 2026.

In the six months leading up to the tournament in July the FA News covered each club ground staging the matches and begin with a trip to Merseyside, where it is scheduled for five internationals on 12th, 15th, 19th, 23rd (quarter final) and 25th(semi final).

The Secretary of Everton, Mr. W. Dickinson, takes over the story for the next three pages of how much these matches mean to the area.

*There is little doubt that the event will be a financial success - ticket bookings have already confirmed that fact. We appreciate that the Merseyside supporter derives his greatest pleasure by watching his. local favourites - Everton.

Liverpool and Tranmere Rovers, or one of the more Jesser known Professional or Amateur clubs in which the region abounds. Granted that Mexico v France may not have the intimate appeal of Everton v Liverpool or England v any country, but soccer on Merseyside has an irresistible appeal."

Stated above in black and white is the fact that one semi final would be played at Goodison Park and when England were due to face Portugal for a place on the final football's governing body FIFA deemed fit to move the match forward 24 hours and stage it at Wembley, the venue where West Germany and Russia were due to play. More money could be made from a sell out England match at Wembley at this crucial stage and so Merseyside lost out for the big day, despite impressive attendances in the Group 3 matches played there (Brazil - Bulgaria, 47,308; Brazil - Hungary, 51,387; Portugal - Brazil, 58,479; and the quarter final Portugal - North Korea, 40.248). The semi final that was staged at Goodison Park was a poor affair with only 38,273 watching West Germany triumph.

A crowd of over 23,000 packed into The Dell at Southampton on a cold

November night to see an England U-23 side defeat their Yugoslavian counterparts 2-1, with local player Martin Chivers in the lineup. Here is a small snippet from the official report and the all important lineup, including one legend from our visitors today:

"For England it was a much stronger test than that provided by France three weeks previously. The winning goal - a superb header by Chivers - came only 11 minutes from the end.

"Three newcomers in the England forward line, [George] Armstrona (Arsenal), [Ernie] Hunt (Wolves) and [Don] Rogers (Swindon Town), added very little in extra thrust to the attack compared with the team which had played at Norwich and England's success again was mainly due to a strong half back line and a well drilled defence."

England U-23: Stepney (Millwall), Lawler (Liverpool), Thomson (Wolves), Hollins (Chelsea), Mobley (Sheffield Weds), Smith (Liverpool),

Armstrong (Arsenal), Hunt (Wolves), Jones (Sheffield Utd), Chivers (Southampton), Rogers (Swindon).

For the record Yugoslavia fielded a side that included seven full internationals and had gone 1-0 down through a Mick Jones goal on 25 minutes, but were level by the break.

Brazil was certainly planning ahead for the next World Cup in 1970 and had formed four new XI's to play matches all around the world:

"One team will consist of players from Sao Paulo and take part in a tour of Africa and the Middle East, where they will play 20 matches. A second eleven from Rio will play, at the same time, 15 matches in the United States and in Asia. A team from Southern Brazil will meet 12 opponents in South America and a fourth with players from the Northern territories will travel to Eastern Europe and play 15 matches."

With all this going, is it any wonder they were World Champions four years later!



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
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

Lines was the provider


again nine minutes later when his delightful through ball found Taylor and his left foot effort comfortably beat Shea to double the lead.

The same combination delivered a second Charlton goal five minutes after the break when Magennis was again allowed the freedom of the area to head his second goal past Puddy.



GOODBYE 'MACCA', IT'S BEEN EMOTIONAL

arely has a player experienced such highs and lows during his time with Bristol Rovers as Mark McChrystal.

Not many (If any?! Answers on a postcard...) score their first - and only - goal for the club against Bristol City at Ashton Gate, McChrystal ticked that box in front of the travelling Gasheads on 4th September 2013. I was there that night, and remember him rising highest in a crowded penalty area to head home Lee Brown's free kick just before the hour mark.

One of Darrell Clarke's first actions after taking over as manager was to make McChrystal captain. He was wearing that armband on the day the club was relegated out of the Football League for the first time. Indeed, as the tension mounted around The Memorial Stadium on 3rd May 2014, McChrystal had a half-chance to change history, lashing a volley just over the crossbar with 15 minutes left.

But in the club's darkest hour, he stayed, and remained skipper.

During the single season in The Vanarama Conference, he even went in goal, away at Wrexham on 2nd December 2014. He kept a clean sheet, of course. "I've never played in goal before so it was an interesting evening." He told us at the BBC. "I said no problem, I'd give it a go. I think I did fine. But I've gone out there and we've got a clean sheet. It's not as easy as it looks."


Neither is skippering his team to victory in the Promotion Play Off Final at Wembley some six months later, I suspect. The penalty shootout win over Grimsby on Sunday 17th May 2015 made sure McChrystal went down in Bristol Rovers history, becoming just the second man to captain the side to a win at the home of football.

I wonder how that compares to Saturday 7th May 2016, when McChrystal led his team to the most dramatic of victories against Dagenham & Redbridge, to clinch back to back promotions?

Mark McChrystal has always been the first to front up to us in the media when it's gone wrong on the pitch, and - it seems - the last to take any glory when it goes well. He came to Bristol Rovers relatively late in his career, but has played more games for The Gas than for any other team. He may not be the first name you think of when recalling the rollercoaster of the past few years, but he was always there, and should not be forgotten.

President Wael Al Oadi told me this week that McChrystal was "Full of class, a great leader and will have a great coaching career". If that's anything like the past four seasons, he's in for quite a ride!

Frenchman Timothee Dieng was also a summer recruit. The 24 year old spent two

seasons at Oldham making 68 (+12) appearances scoring one goal from midfield.

Nathaniel Knight-Percival spent six seasons at non league Histon before joining Wrexham, Subsequent moves took the 29 year old defender to Peterborough and then Shrewsbury before joining Bradford in the summer of 2016.

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
