






Firstly, may I wish every supporter a warm welcome to Gigg Lane for today's game.

I have only been with the club for two weeks but it's been a really busy time. My role is to concentrate on the business and operational side of the club to leave the Chairman, Manager and coaching team to deal with the football side. I am so glad the transfer window doesn't come under my remit, having viewed the stresses of deadline day, through our hard working media team, and it's a real day of uncertainty which leads to massive frustration for everyone involved.

My main areas of responsibility are those of fan engagement and recognising commercial opportunities. I have decided to go back to basics and rebuild the foundations of both areas. I have no idea, at present, how the club has become, in the eyes of the fans, disengaged with them but I intend to investigate this as soon as possible and address the issues in a structured way. I believe any club is built around its fans, there are too many that take them for granted, which is something I do not intend to do. It has to be accepted that the club will, from time to time, make some difficult decisions that may not be universally popular but, as I have explained to many people, football is not a business to get involved in if you want to be the most popular person in the world, but what always has to be at the heart of any decision, is the good

name of the club, which is bigger than any individual.

As I said earlier, it has been a whirlwind 2 weeks of meetings, including: staff, fans and partners and I have taken a huge amount from all of them. I will continue to do this over the next few weeks as I need as much background as possible before we move forward together. I am not hand picking people, today, for example, I am due to meet a group of individual fans that I asked our Supporter Liaison Officer, Ben Miles, to choose at random, I need a mixture of opinions, both good and bad, from the full range of our fan base and will be reporting back my initial findings and subsequent progress in future programme articles.

I know talk is cheap so I have to back these words up, it is my intention and indeed it is already in the diary to meet, at least monthly, with Forever Bury, I felt my first meeting with Dave and Rob went well last week and will grow as we get to know each other. In addition, I have asked Ben Miles to propose a format for a Fans Forum that will meet 5 or 6 times a year, this group will be representatives of the fans and, once this has an agreed format, I will, again, report back in a future programme article.

With regards to commerciality, the club has limited inventory but there is still room for improvement. We have a good sized stadium for League One, a magnificent training facility, a good

social media following and a long rich history as a football club, something for many clubs to be envious of. I have already recognised that we have plenty of opportunities within the local business community to support or partner with the club, and together with the Commercial team, we have to put together a programme that means we have a good, honest, solid relationship where, if anything, we under promise and over deliver. I believe football clubs should be the hub of any community, Bury FC can be this again, it's our way forward, and we have to re-engage.

Your support, as fans and businesses, is vital to the club, I want to make us accessible and as transparent as a football club can be so all I ask is that you bear with me, give me time to build a plan and, hopefully, we can all take this great club forward together.

Good afternoon and welcome to Gigg Lane for our game, today, versus Swindon Town.

Last week saw the transfer window close and it was only the second time the Football League has experienced this and the first for myself. It was a strange final day as we missed out on a few targets due to other clubs reluctance to let their players go or recent injuries. I am, however, happy with the 10 additions we have been able to bring into the squad during this period and, I believe, we have managed to mix a blend of youth and experience as well as strengthening key areas, especially in defence. That, with the return of players from injury, has now given us a strong squad going into the remaining fixtures and I'm sure everyone, in some capacity, will have to play their part.

I felt, in the first window, we have suffered due to lack of strength in depth in the squad and also with injuries and suspensions, which are part and parcel of the game but this has also affected us. You cannot anticipate what can happen during the course of a season but with a healthy squad it is easier to cope

during troubled times.

I was disappointed last weekend with our performance at Shrewsbury. It was the first time, since I took charge, I felt we did not at the very least match a side in respect of hard work and endeavour. Bury Football Club is built, in my opinion, on this and the Latin motto "Vincit Omnia Industria" (Industry Conquers All) on the clubs badge even explains this.

What has been pleasing though has been the response this week in training. I've never looked for excuses and I won't start now. Yes, Shrewsbury may have trained on their pitch all week to prevent us from passing the ball but it shouldn't stop or prevent your commitment or courage on trying to play football on any surface. The players this week have readdressed this and shown the level of commitment expected and I know we will carry that out today.

We have 16 huge games of football between now and the end of the season and as well as the squad you, as supporters, will play your part. That is one thing I have noticed with you, the fans, that during tough times you have stuck together more than any fans I know. Whether through league position, financial positions or changes in personnel you keep the faith and belief in this special football club and we must, once again, show that in each other and in this group of players. I believe in them, they believe in you and together we must trust and encourage each other until the end of the season.

I am being kept updated by our media staff on the condition of Brian Allen. Brian was sadly taken very ill shortly before last weekend's game at Shrewsbury and his family have our support during these difficult days whilst he is cared for, in intensive care, in Shrewsbury, our thoughts and wishes for a speedy recovery are with the entire Allen family. As a club we have issued an invitation to Brian to come to a game once he is well enough to do so, so get well soon Brian, but take your time over it.

On to today's game and Swindon who, like ourselves, find themselves in a tough position. I believe that they play football in the correct manner and I'm anticipating an exciting game of attacking football. I would like to take this opportunity to welcome Luke Williams and his staff, directors and supporters of Swindon Town and hope you enjoy your experience of Gigg Lane today.

Deadline Day Round Up

Deadline Day was a frustrating day for all concerned with the January transfer window now closed. The Chairman and Chris Brass spent the best part of the whole day working on several deals that never quite got over the line, If these deals had been done, then our coverage of 'Deadline Day' would have been a whole lot sweeter for all, but you live and learn.

In total, the club saw movement on fifteen players throughout the month of January with ten arriving and five departing, either permanently or on loan.

Deadline day brought five players on the move, as shown below:

OUT: Undisclosed fee takes Tom Soares away from Gigg Lane.

Tom Soares has joined fellow EFL Sky Bet League One side AFC Wimbledon for an undisclosed fee

Soares joined the Shakers in July 2012 on non-contract terms. Signed by then manager Kevin Blackwell, Tom would go on to become something of a utility player for the club playing in several positions over the years.

Writing himself into Shakers folklore, Tom scored the only goal of the game as the Shakers won automatic promotion to League One at Tranmere Rovers on the final day of the 2014 15 season.

During his five year stay at Gigg Lane, Tom made 174 appearances with a further 13 appearances from the bench - scoring 22 goals with his last goal for the club coming last weekend with a dramatic 93rd minute equaliser against Walsall.

Out: Jacob Bedeau joins Aston Villa for undisclosed fee and moves to Villa Park. Young defender Jacob Bedeau has joined Championship side Aston Villa after an undisclosed fee was received by the club for his services.

Jacob arrived at the club, after being released by Leyton Orient, at an early age and quickly established himself within the club's Academy system. His performances and work ethic saw him stand out to coaching staff and his progress to the Youth team came as no surprise to anyone within the Academy at Carrington.

Progress for the 17-year-old was swift, under the leadership of Ryan Kidd and his coaching team, and he was soon training, and playing, with the First team squad. Jacob made his first appearance for the senior side as a half time substitute in the recent game with Millwall at Gigg Lane. His full debut came in the following game when he put in a commanding performance against Bristol Rovers at the Memorial Stadium and since breaking into the side, Jacob has made just seven appearances.

His move, to Villa Park, sees him become the fifth Academy player to leave the club, for Championship or Premier League sides, in recent times and highlights the levels that the system is now achieving for the club and, with plenty more players coming through the system, bigger clubs are more than paying attention to the Shakers Youth system.

The deal to land Jacob, with clauses in the club's favour, is not too far short of a new record transfer fee for the club. The clauses that the club has inserted into the transfer for Jacob's future career will benefit the club if he continues to progress along his current career path.

Out: Midfielder Neil Danns moves to Bloomfield Road on loan until to the end of the season

Veteran midfielder Neil Danns has joined EFL Sky Bet League Two side Blackpool on loan until the end of the current season.

Neil joined the club over the summer months, in time for the club's pre-season trip to Tenerife after leaving Bolton Wanderers at the end of last season.

After making just 21 appearances for the club, and scoring two goals, Neil will now link up with Gary Bowyer's Blackpool

In: Defender Tom Beadling arrives on loan from Premier League side Sunderland

Having been Sunderland since the age of eight, Tom is an old-school type defender who has risen through the Wearside club's ranks extremely well. Having made nine appearances for the under-18's in 2012-13 and after breaking into the development squad in the final game of their campaign - a 2-2 draw against Fulham at Craven Cottage - Tom has become a regular face in the Black Cats under-21's.

Since then, Tom has trained with the first team and cemented his place in Andy Welsh's under-21 side and even managed to weigh in with two goals during the 2015-16 season. Tom was also involved for the Mackems under-23's side in this seasons Checkatrade Trophy.

In: Sylvain Deslandes arrives from Wolves on loan until the end of the season.

Sylvain Deslandes joined Wolves in July, 2015, after his contract with French side SM Caen expired and he linked up with Wolves on a preseason training camp at Clairefontaine.


A pacey, left footed, defender who can either play at full back or in the centre of the back-line, Deslandes figured strongly for the under-21 squad during his first season. He was also around the first team squad for much of the campaign, mainly as a substitute. He made two early Capital One Cup starts, added to by three league starts in the closing stages of the season.






Head Coach - Luke Williams

The highly-rated coach was announced as Town's new Head coach in January 2016 and put pen to paper on a fiveyear deal. Williams started his coaching career with Brighton & Hove Albion's under-21's side, before joining the Reds as First-team coach in 2013.

He played a huge role in helping Town reach the League One Play-off Final at Wembley in May 2015 and was also in strumental in developing the careers of the likes of Ryan Mason, Alex Pritchard Yaser Kasim, Ben Gladwin, Massimo Luongo and Nathan Byrne.









Moving to Bury from Wolves in June 2015, he netted 15 goals in 32 League games prior to joining Sheffield United in July 2016. Darren Bullock, Tommy Henderson, Vince Jack, Barry Lowes, Kevin Moore and Temitope Obadeyi have also played for both clubs, while Bobby Smith managed both.

LEADING MARKSMAN: One-time Swindon Town striker Ken Beamish was Bury's leading marksman in 1978-79. Moving to Gigg Lane from Port Vale for £35,000 in September 1978, he played alongside Dave Gregory in Bury's attack and netted 20 goals in 49 Third Division games for the Shakers prior to rejoining Tranmere Rovers in November 1979.

He joined Swindon as player-coach in August 1981 and made two League appearances for the Robins under John Trollope, then was manager at the County Ground from March 1983 until succeeded by Lou Macari in June




CUP HERO: Former Bury central defender Billy Tucker featured prominently as Swindon Town reached the League Cup semi-finals in 1979-80. Moving to Gigg Lane from Hereford United for £5,000 in December 1976, he starred as Bury reached the League Cup fifth round in 1977-78 and scored eight times in 96 Third Division games for the Shakers before reuniting with Andy Rowland at Bobby Smith's Swindon for £15,000 in June 1979.

He netted four goals in 35 Third Division outings while at the County Ground prior to joining Cheltenham Town in July 1980.

EVER-PRESENT: Former Swindon Town left-half Gordon Atherton was ever-present five times for Bury. Moving to Gigg Lane from Bury Amateurs in September 1955, he made his League debut in that month's 1-1 draw at home to West Ham, starring in Bury's 1960-61 Third Division title triumph and 1962-63 League Cup run.

He joined Swindon in December 1964 and made 31 League appearances while at the County Ground prior to re-joining Bury in January 1966. Scoring 13 goals in 334 League games overall for the Shakers, he moved to Drumcondra in September 1966.



TOP SCORER: Former Swindon Town striker Andy Rowland was Bury's top scorer in three successive seasons. Moving to Gigg Lane from Derby County for £7,000 in August 1974, the England Youth international featured in Bury's 1977-78 League Cup run.

He scored 58 times in 174 Third Division games for the Shakers before following Bobby Smith to Swindon for £80,000 in September 1978. Helping them to reach the League Cup semi-finals in 1979-80 and win the Fourth Division title in 1985-86, he netted 80 goals in 287 League outings prior to joining their coaching staff.

PROMOTION WINNER: Ex-Swindon Town left-back Brian Williams starred in Bury's 1973-74 promotion success. He was Bury's youngest-ever League debutant at 16 years 133 days in the 4-0 victory at home to Stockport County in March 1972 and scored 19 times in 159 League outings before being sold to QPR for £70,000 in July 1977.

Moving to Swindon in June 1978, he helped them to reach the League Cup semi-finals in 1979-80 and netted eight goals in 99 League games while at the County Ground prior to joining Bristol Rovers in exchange for Gary Emmanuel in July 1981.

The goalkeeper put pen to paper on a permanent deal at Swindon Town in the summer of 2016 after a productive loan spell at SN1 during the 2015-16 season. Vigouroux was snapped up by Tottenham in 2012 before sealing a move to Premier League rivals Liverpool in the summer of 2014 after being allowed to leave White Hart Lane.

The former Chilean youth international was a regular for the under-21 side at Anfield before moving on loan to Town last term. Vigouroux has made 30 outings for the Robins so far this season, keeping eight clean sheets.





A product of the STFC Academy, the fan favourite first burst on to the first-team scene during the 2012-13 campaign. The tough-tackling defender was a regular as Swindon made the League One Play-offs that term.

Thompson is a pivotal figure at The County Ground and is one of the first names on the teamsheet such is his importance to the team. The two-time "Player of the Year" winner is the current Skipper at SN1 and is one of only five players to have captained the Town at Wembley.

Town won the race to sign the highlyrated attacker from non-league outfit Woking for an undisclosed fee in the summer of 2016.

Goddard, who was once on the books of Reading as a youngster, netted 20 times for the Cards last term and has impressive for Town so far this term, contributing three goals and five assists.

Norris arrived at The County Ground on a three-year deal from Gillingham at the start of the 2016-17 campaign, making his Swindon debut in the EFL Cup against Queens Park Rangers.

The striker started his career in nonleague football with Hitchin Town before being snapped up by Brentford. He then departed the Bees for Gillingham in the summer of 2015 and went on to net eight times for the Kent club in 2015-16.

Joined Town for a third spell on Transfer Deadline Day last month. Began his career with Manchester United and went on to have stints with Bury, Peterborough United and Leeds United. However, he has really proven himself at SN1 and notched 35 goals in 61 outings across his first two spells at SN1.

Nicky was Town's top scorer last season with 25 goals in competition, form which led to a big money move to Charlton Athletic in the summer. However, Ajose will now spend the remainder of the 2016-17 campaign, on loan, at The County Ground.

Brandon Ormonde-Ottewill: The left wingback joined Town from Premier League giants Arsenal in 2015 having risen through the youth ranks with the Gunners, BOO, as he is fondly known by the Town faithful, enjoyed a solid debut campaign at SN1 and is known for his ability to get forward and support attacks.

Conor Thomas: A summer signing at The County Ground having parted ways with boyhood club Coventry City at the end of the 2015-16 campaign. The midfielder spent 15 years with the Sky Blues and

racked up over 100 appearances during his time in the Midlands. Highlyrated as a youngster, Thomas spent a short spell on loan with Liverpool in 2011 and put pen to paper on a three-year deal at SN1 after impressing whilst on trial.

Anton Rodgers: Son of Celtic manager Brendan, the midfielder has been with Town since the summer of 2014 after joining on a free transfer from Celtic. Once on the books at Chelsea, Rodgers went on to have spells with Brighton and Hove Albion and Oldham before getting a chance to shine at SN1. Tidy on the ball and with the ability to spot a pass,

the 23-year-old has now made over 50 appearances for the Robins.

Jamie Sendles-White: The former QPR defender joined Town on a short-term deal in February 2016 on a free transfer. Following spells with Colchester United and Mansfield Town, the Northern Ireland under-21 international joined Hamilton Academicals at the start of the 2015-16 campaign before departing north of the border to join Town. After impressing at SN1, Sendles-White signed a new deal in the summer but is currently sidelined after rupturing his ACL ligaments.

Ben Gladwin: Returned to SN1 for a third spell earlier this month after joining on

loan from QPR until the end of the season. Was snapped up by Town from non-league outfit Marlow in 2013 and really burst onto the scene during the 2014-15 campaign, hitting eleven goals in 41 outings to help the Reds reach the League One Play-off Final at Wembley. Sealed a big money move to QPR that summer but has struggled to nail down a first-team place at Loftus Road and was back in Wiltshire last season, scoring two goals in thirteen games during a short loan spell. He scored on his third debut for the club, away at Bolton Wanderers, in January 2017.

Bradford City and went on to score in his first four games, equalling a record set by Swindon's all-time record goalscorer, Harry Morris, in 1926.

James Brophy: After spending time in nonleague with Edgware Town, the defender was invited for a trial with Town and did enough to earn a contract for the 2015 16 campaign. Brophy impressed during his first season at SN1 and was awarded with a new contract. He has kicked-on again this season and bagged his first goal for Town during the EFL Cup tie against QPR

August.

Will Henry: The young stopper is another product of the STFC Academy and was handed his debut at Rochdale last term, making an instant impact after saving a penalty. Henry has made two outings so far this term and produced a string of fine saves during Town 2-1 Checkatrade Trophy victory over Chelsea under-23's earlier the month. He is just one of a number of promising youngsters currently on the fringes of the first team at SN1.

Ellis landolo: The young attack-minded midfielder put pen to paper on a professional deal with Town in August 2015 following a short trial period.

Released by Gillingham as a youngster, the prospect then joined the Soccer Elite FA Academy where he caught the eye of Town, landolo is certainly one to watch for Swindon fans after producing a string of promising displays last term.

Tom Smith: Another highly-rated youngster who signed his first professional contract in the summer after coming through the Academy system. Made his Town debut in 2015 away at Preston North End before making a further two substitute appearances last term. The all-action midfielder scored his first senior goal at Crewe Alexandra last season after rifling home a thunderbolt from the edge of the 18-yard box.



Yaser Kasim: A regular fixture at SN1 since arriving on a free transfer ahead of the 2013-14 campaign. The classy holding midfielder, who has had stints with Tottenham Hotspur, Brighton and Hove Albion, Luton Town and Macclesfield Town. has made over a century of appearances for Town scoring seven goals. Kasim is also a full international for Iraq and represented his country at the 2015 Asian Cup in Australia.

Jon Obika: The popular striker is now a key player for the Town and has hit three goals so far this season after being hit by a string of injuries. Signed from Tottenham Hotspur on Transfer Deadline Day in 2014, Obika netted twice on his debut away at



Jordan Stewart: The tricky forward signed for the Town from Northern Ireland Premiership side, Glentoran in the summer of 2015. Made his debut at Millwall in October of that year before spending the latter part of the 2015-16 season out on loan at Grimsby Town. Jordan made a bright to this campaign and opened his account for the club away at QPR in August.

Islam Feruz: On loan from Premier League giants Chelsea, until the end of the season, having arrived at The County Ground in

January 2017 and has had a number of loan spells with the likes of Hibernian and Blackpool and has plenty of pace to burn.

Jake Evans: Another home-grown product who has been tipped to enjoy a bright future at SN1. He signed his first senior contract in April after making his Town debut on the final day of the 2015-16 campaign against Shrewsbury Town.

Charlie Colkett: One of three Chelsea players currently on loan at SN1. Colkett is highly-rated by the Blues and impressed during a loan spell with Bristol Rovers earlier this season. Known for his range of passing and creativity

in the middle of the park, Colkett has already caught the eye during his short time with Town.

Fankaty Dabo: The on-loan Chelsea defender is currently enjoying his first loan spell away from Stamford Bridge having progressed through the Youth ranks at the club. Boasts plenty of pace and power and can play anywhere across the back-four, while he also likes to bomb forward to support attacks on occasion.

Jesse Starkey: Joined Town on Transfer Deadline Day from Brighton & Hove Albion for an undisclosed fee. He began his career with Chelsea before sealing a move to the Seagulls' Development Squad in 2013. The

midfielder has represented England at under-18 level and is known for his ability from set-pieces.

Rohan Ince: The midfielder was one of three arrivals on Transfer Deadline Day and is on loan at SN1 until the end of the season. Another ex-Chelsea Academy product, the powerful enforcer has over 70 games in the Championship under his belt for both Brighton and Fulham and will add plenty of strength to the Reds' midfield.

Jermaine Hylton: The pacey striker

Hove Albion defender is the nephew of none other than the Everton and ex-England midfielder, Gareth Barry. He joined Town on a trial period before putting pen to paper on a permanent contract in August 2015. Has become a vital player for the club and was awarded the "Players' Player of the Season" Award at the end of

Bradley Barry: The former Brighton and

Lloyd Jones: Joined Town on a seasonlong loan deal from Liverpool in August 2016. Plymouthborn Jones moved to Anfield from his hometown club in 2011 and has been a regular in the Liverpool Academy sides ever since. As well as being named on the first-team bench for the Reds, the towering defender has also spent time out on loan with Cheltenham Town, Accrington Stanley and Blackpool.

Raphael Rossi-Branco: Formerly with the Academy at Brighton and Hove Albion, the Brazilian centre-half penned a deal with Town in the summer of 2013 after a successful trial

period. He stepped off the bench to make his league debut in a 1-1 draw at Bradford City later that season. He has been a regular fixture in Town's defensive ever since and has clocked up over a century of appearances for the Robins.

Jordan Young: Widely regarded as one of the club's hottest prospects, the teenager penned a three-year deal at The County Ground in the summer of 2016 whilst still a second-year scholar. A highly-rated talent at SN1, Young made his Town debut against Port Vale in February 2016 aged 16 and 185 days - the fourth-youngest player to make their Swindon bow after Lloyd Macklin, Paul Rideout and Ernie Hunt.

penned a two-and-a-half year contract with Swindon in the January 2015 transfer window after joining from non-league side, Redditch United. Notched against Peterborough United during the 2014-15 campaign and was part of the side that reached the League One Play-off Final. Injury hampered his progress last term but Hylton has been on the fringes of the firstteam this season.

Dion Conroy: Put pen to paper on a twoand-a-half-year deal with Town in January 2016 after joining for an undisclosed fee from Chelsea. Dion didn't make an appearance for the Blues' first-team but the centre-back did impress for Aldershot on loan during the first-half of this season







IT may have been imagination but I'm certain you could hear the strains of Christmas' number one record, Bob the Builder, emanating from the Shakers dressing room after this game.

"Can we fix it? . . . Yes, we can!" seemed to be the message coming out loud and clear as battling Bury put the clock back months to register their first league victory since October 5th.

A Paul Barnes strike - his second in as many games - was the difference between the sides at the final whistle but the Shakers should really have had the game sewn up by the interval. On this performance there's not a great deal new coach Billy Ayre will have to tinker with to get the Shakers back up the table.

The amiable north-easterner sat in the stand for the first half and was well pleased with the application shown by An dy Preece's side as they put in one of their best displays of the campaign.

"What I enjoyed was the way the players approached the game," he said. "When fans talk about games they aren't usually far off the mark. So when the team is applauded off the pitch at half time you're doing something right.

"They could see the effort the players had put in and that's what they're paying their money to see."

Ady Littlejohn had a powerful drive hacked off the line by Sol Davis following a huge throw by Sam Collins but the Robins' luck ran out on the half hour when Barnes struck. The Swindon defence failed to clear, after a Daws miss-hit shot ricocheted around the box and the strikers powerful drive careered off a defender and looped over Bart Gremink into the net.

It was just the kind of luck that had been missing from the Shakers armoury and warmed the majority of the 2,921 fans in the shivering stands immensely. Jarrett should have doubled the tally four minutes later when he headed a Littlejohn cross well wide with the goal at his mercy but the surging runs that the local youngster continued to make were a constant source of trouble to the Swindon back line.

He almost had a hand, in a second goal just before the interval after his left wing cross was dropped by Gremink under pressure from Barnes but the big Dutchman's defenders spared his blushes by clearing to safety. After the break it was the home side that continued to do all the pressing with Littlejohn going close again midway through the half when his header from Jarrett's cross was somehow blocked by the outstretched foot of Gremink.

But as a deserved second goal never came so the litters set in for Bury in the closing minutes. And it was Paddy Kenny, who had been a virtual spectator for most of the game, who saved the day.

He superbly palmed away former Nottingham Forest ace Ian Woan's 30-yard free kick two minutes from the interval then got his central defender Chris Swailes out of the mire by amazingly pushing his deflection away from goal saving him the embarrassment of an own

"It's a major relief," explained a delighted Preece. "In our last five games at home we haven't lost but we really needed that league

"All the lads were absolutely superb, their attitude was first class with all eleven working for each other. It was back to the kind of performance that we were putting in early in the season."



The Shakers eased off in the second half, though, and Walsall made them pay. Matt Preston had a shot blocked on the line and Lainton denied Isaiah Osbourne from the rebound. But Oztumer hit a 20-vard freekick into the bottom corner on 71 minutes to spark the Saddlers' fightback.

Five minutes later, McCarthy fired home from Bakayoko's cut-back before the Southampton loanee headed home from Osbourne's cross. Soares then glanced in Brown's cross to rescue a point but Bury remain in the relegation zone.



Of course, I would love to see a Bury team progress with a bunch of local talented youngsters, capable of playing, both for themselves and the team, at a higher level, but with



Bury in action on...11th February

1888: In Bury's first recorded game on this day George Ross scored a hat trick and Billy Pollock weighed in with two goals in a 5-0 friendly victory over West Manchester at Gigg Lane.

1893: Bury were still playing Lancashire League football when they entertained Liverpool, who had only been formed in the last twelve months. Even then the Merseysiders were a strong outfit and had hammered the Shakers 4-0 at Anfield earlier in the season. But, on this day, Bury came out on top 3-0, with goals from Billy Barbour, Jack Plant and Albert Spence.

1899: In the FA Cup Second Round Bury were knocked out following a 2-1 defeat away at West Bromwich Albion. The Shakers would though go on to achieve ultimate glory in the competition the following season.

1905: Bury were away at Goodison Park where they were defeated 2-0, by goals from Harold Hardman and former Shakers forward James Settle, who in 1899 had been the first Bury player to receive an International cap, when he was called up to play for England against Ireland.

1911: Everton were again the opposition, this time in front of a Gigg Lane crowd of 6,206, which to the visitors would have seemed somewhat lacking in atmosphere, as they had played Liverpool in the Merseyside derby a week earlier in front of 50,000 fans at Goodison. The resulting goalless draw at Bury did little to lift the atmosphere.

1913: Bob Perry's goal at Glossop North End failed to prevent

Bury from going out of the Manchester Senior Cup at the first stage following a 2-1 defeat.

1920: A 1-0 Wednesday afternoon home win over West Ham United moved Bury up to eleventh place in Division Two, whilst a win for the visitors would have put them fourth. The winning goal came from Shakers centre forward James Lister.

1922: Bury entertained Leeds United just a week after a 2-0 defeat against them at Elland Road, in which Len Armitage had been a scorer. He was on the mark again at Gigg Lane, but on this occasion Bury came out on top, when two goals from Norman Bullock gave the Shakers a 2-1 win.

1933: Bury consolidated their third-place position in Division Two with a resounding 6-1 home win over West Ham United. The goals came from Dave Robbie (2), Billy Chalmers (2), Les Vernon and Wally Amos. The Shakers have failed to win any competitive game played on this day ever since in eleven attempts.

1956: Goals from left winger Norman Lawson and a twelfth of the season for the inspirational, but now veteran 37-year-old inside forward Stan Pearson, helped Bury to a 2-2 draw in their home game with Port Vale.


1961: Bury travelled down to Watford for their Saturday afternoon game with their new signing from Newcastle United, Bob Stokoe, who had joined the Shakers the previous day in a deal that saw John McGrath going in the opposite direction. Stokoe immediately took over the captaincy from McGrath and guided Bury with the help of a Bill Holden goal, to a 1-1 draw at Vicarage Road, which kept them in second place in Division

games Bury drew 1-1 with bottom of the league Northampton Town, with their goal coming in the second half from John Thomson, who equalised a first half strike from John Farrington...


In the same division, Swindon Town beat Chesterfield 3-0 at home with goals from Steve Aizlewood, Trevor Anderson and a Ray McHale penalty.



30 years ago this week in 1987

A tenth goal of the season from Nigel Greenwood was enough to give Bury all three points and their third consecutive win, in their Division Three home game with York City...

Also in the Third Division, Swindon's home game with Walsall was called off, but they were just about to embark on a seven-game winning run and a week earlier they been knocked out



of the FA Cup, losing their Fourth Round home tie with Second Division Leeds United 1-2, in which Dave Bamber was their scorer.



Three, just behind the leaders Queens Park Rangers. Far from disrupting Bury's promotion push, the arrival of the vastly experienced but still only 30-year-old central defender, Stokoe settled and improved the side and they did not lose any of their remaining 16 games, conceding just 6 goals, whilst scoring an amazing 34.

1966: Barry Lowes, a right winger signed from Workington, where he had scored 12 goals the previous season, made his Bury debut at Ashton Gate in their away game against Bristol City. The Shakers were beaten 2-1, with their goal coming from Jack Maltby.

1967: Having lost their previous three games without scoring a single goal, relegation threatened Bury's trip to third placed Carlisle United failed to deliver a positive change to their miserable set of results, with the 2-0 defeat merely adding to their woes and seeing them drop ever closer to the basement of Division Two and even the imminent arrival of Bobby Collins, Alex Dawson, Greg Farrell and Hugh Tinney, failed to halt the downward slide.

1976: Bury went down in their away game at Chesterfield, where despite two goals from Andy Rowland, strikes for the Spireites from Steve Cammack and two from Malcolm Darling, who appeared for Bury two years later, gave the home side a 3-2 win.

1984: Promotion chasing Doncaster Rovers came to Gigg Lane in fine form with just one defeat in their last nineteen games and went into a two-goal lead by half time through David Harle and Ernie Moss. Craig Madden almost earned the Shakers a point in the second half with two goals, but it was the older of the two

Snodin brothers in the Rovers side, Glyn, who made it 3-2 for the visitors.

1989: Steve Moran's first half goal for Reading looked to be enough to give them a win against Bury at Elm Park, but with only a couple of minutes remaining Jamie Hoyland popped up with his sixth goal of the season, to earn the Shakers a point in a 1-1 draw.

1992: There were absolutely no positives to be obtained from Bury's midweek 4-0 defeat on this day away at Bournemouth. Efan Ekoku (2), Denny Mundee and Jimmy Quinn were the Cherries scorers, whilst Bury were lucky to get nil.

1997: In the Auto Windscreen's Shield, Northern Section Quarter Final Bury were at home to fellow Division Two promotion rivals Stockport County. A soft penalty for an alleged handball by Dean West was converted by Tony Dinning to put the visitors ahead, before Paul Butler forced home the equaliser for the Shakers. With the match still at 1-1 after 90 minutes, the game went straight to sudden death and it seemed that Bury had clinched the tie when Chris Lucketti headed home, but the referee controversially disallowed it and a couple of minutes later a Brett Angell shot found the net to steal the win for County.

goal for the club from Alex Smith, gave them a 2-1 win, with Andy Hunt getting Albion's reply.




10 years ago this week in 2007

To travel up the east coast of Scotland is a journey that takes you through the 'old' Scottish Second Division.

Arbroath, Forfar Athletic, Cowdenbeath and Montrose are exotic sounding names that tripped off the tongue of John Webster as he read out the results on Sports Report on a 1950's wintry Saturday evening. You plotted their progress through the season on your League Ladder that had come free with your Lion comic.

Everyone had (has?) a pet Scottish Second Division team and mine, although I can't give a rational explanation why, is Brechin City. I remember being excited when their programme arrived to be added to my growing collection. Even now, years later, I look out for their result on a Saturday night, but I have yet to keep my promise to myself that one day I would go to Glebe Park to watch them.

As a young lad I had spent much of my pocket money in pursuit of acquiring a match programme from every English and Scottish League club. In 1978, my eldest son Adam (along with children up and down the country) was given a new quest when a Panini sticker album came free with the 'Shoot!' comic.

With over 500 stickers needed to fill the album it was a considerable. not to say, potentially expensive task despite the opportunity of "swops" in the school yard. One day my father called round to our house with four unopened boxes of packets he'd

found in a skip at work and Adam still couldn't complete his album!

Liverpool born David Pugh enjoyed success at non-League Runcorn in the late 1980's where he was a team mate of Mark Carter. In July 1989. he joined Third Division Chester City where he went on to make 103 League appearances scoring 28 goals.

David, another shrewd signing by Shakers boss Mike Walsh, in the summer 1994 renewed acquaintances with his old Runcorn team mate Mark Carter. In 1994-95 David was an ever present and finished the season top scorer seeming to particularly enjoy finding the back of the Northampton Town net scoring a total of five times in the 5-0 victories both home and away. However, probably his most memorable goal came at Deepdale in the first leg of the Play-off tussle with Preston North End, and he had the proud distinction of being the first captain to lead out a Shakers team at Wembley.

The following season, again amongst the goals. David led the Shakers to automatic promotion and on a nerve jangling last day of the season scored the first of the three goals that defeated Cardiff City.

Unfortunately, injuries limited his appearances in the 1996-97 Division Two Championship success but he came on, as a late substitute, on the final game of the season and raised the trophy with Chris Lucketti. On

the opening day of 1997-98, at home to Reading, David sustained a knee injury that, sadly, brought his playing career to an end but he had made a valuable contribution to one of the most successful periods of the Shakers' history.

It doesn't matter who you are or where you are you can't have a game unless there's a pitch to play on. Nowadays, a lot of time and money is spent by clubs embracing technical developments to improve their playing surface as well as reducing the amount of wear and tear to their pitches by restricting its use to just First team home fixtures.

Of course, the weather also has a big part to play but today you will rarely see a game played on a snow covered pitch with just the line markings exposed. I must admit I used to enjoy playing on snow but rock hard frozen pitches were a very different matter. Gigg Lane always enjoyed a reputation for being an excellent playing surface but others were not.

I remember going to Rotherham's old Millmoor ground, towards the end of a season, and there wasn't a blade of grass on the pitch. Derby County's Baseball Ground pitch was, perennially, a mud bath and I recall a game, on TV, when a penalty was awarded requiring the groundsman armed with a bucket and brush to paint a penalty spot after the referee had decided its position!

Good afternoon ladies and gentlemen and boys and girls. Welcome to Gigg Lane for our game today with our old friends from the County Ground and we hope that everyone connected with Swindon Town FC, especially the travelling supporters who have made the long trip up from Wiltshire, enjoys their visit to Bury this afternoon - result apart, naturally! Thank you for your support today; it really is appreciated by everyone at Bury Football Club.

Well, our little, three game, unbeaten run didn't last long did it? A fairly dismal performance at Shrewsbury, last Saturday, saw to that. It was a performance where we really didn't get going until we found ourselves a couple of goals down and, by then, it was too late. It wasn't as bad a performance as some we have witnessed this season it was just one of those where the strikers didn't get the service they needed and we weren't that creative in midfield and, to be honest, I expect to see changes in the starting line-up today to amend the situation. We were lacking someone who could take the game by the scruff of the neck and dominate it, make things happen and stop them playing the ball through our midfield but I don't think we are a million miles away from it but we have to stop conceding soft goals too. We did it at Shrewsbury and we did it the game before when we failed to kill off Walsall after going two goals up. We stopped doing what we'd done to get ourselves into that position and if it hadn't been for Tom Soares injury time equalizer we have turned a two goal lead Into a 3 - 2 defeat and that sort of thing has got to stop.

I have to say I was a bit surprised to hear Tom Soares had been allowed to go to AFC Wimbledon on transfer deadline day but, if I'm honest, I wasn't that surprised to hear Neil Danns was allowed to join Blackpool until the end of the season, however, I did have a sense of relief that others such as James Vaughan, Tom Pope and Danny Mayor remained at the club.

Another player who exited Gigg for a new start was young Jacob Bedeau who is a real prospect for the future and with all due respect to Jacob and to Aston Villa I thought that at least one Premier (Greed IS Good) League club would have made a bid for him but I'm sure he'll be a fine signing for Villa and that he'll have a fine career. It is a pity that we couldn't hold on to him for a wee while but finances being what they are it would be wrong for both club and player not to let him make the move.

On the other hand though we should bid welcome to Tom Beadling, say bienvenue á Sylvain Deslandes and fáilté to Joe Murphy who joined us, on-loan, from Sunderland, Wolves and Huddersfield Town, respectively on deadline day.

We've brought a total of ten players in. whilst five have departed, so we do have that little bit of extra cover in areas where it was sadly lacking and, therefore, in my opinion, we can no longer use the excuse of our injury list which, to be fair, has been horrendous or suspensions as we now have, virtually, a fully fit squad with no one currently suspended. We have no further opportunities to strengthen until the summer and so, the lads in the squad, will have to start to string results

together and get us up the table. We have forty-eight points to play for and I expect we will need a minimum of twenty-four to remain in this division. We have some huge "six-pointers" coming up and we, as fans, need to do our bit and get behind the lads starting today. We had a great following down at the New Meadow last weekend - and I hope the Shakers fan who, sadly, took ill before the game is recovering well - and that sort of backing at home could prove to be vital. We have to think positive and be positive because the fat lass isn't singing yet!

Away from HQ and it was good to see some of the Premier (Greed IS Good) League and, indeed, some Championship clubs get their comeuppance in the FA Cup after fielding weakened sides. Maybe it's just me but, mostly, it seems to be clubs run by foreign managers who, perhaps, don't get just how much a part of history the FA Cup is in English football and field, in some cases, sides with up to ten changes. It's about time the Football Association - and the Football League, in regard of the League Cup, showed some backbone and added a rule that teams must field a minimum of seven players from the previous league game and seven players who played in the cup-tie in the following league game. To field a weakened side again, in my opinion, shows disrespect to their opposition, their fans, the opposition fans, the tournament sponsors and to the history of the competition itself and, frankly, it needs to stop before the two tournaments become a total farce.

But, finally, as always, enjoy today's game. C'mon you Shakers!



On a footballing level, I will miss Tom and the contribution he has made to our team and club. His goal at Tranmere, which clinched promotion, will obviously live long in the memory but there are many other highlights to savour too.

However, knowing the sacrifices he and his family, who are based in London, have made since he joined Bury from Stoke City, one cannot but be pleased that his new club are much more conveniently placed for someone based in South London. Tom is not the only footballer who has commuted long miles on days off and on a Saturday night after a game to spend precious time with family and sometimes those of us who are fans perhaps do not see this human side of the football story.

One of the privileges of being Chaplain to a football club is I minister to the whole person and to everyone at the club, First team star or not. Whilst this ought not to be taken lightly or abused, it does, sometimes, make you realise the sacrifices that players and coaching staff, and their loved ones and families, often make for a career in football. Football is a great game to be involved in but it can also be a very demanding master too!

Perhaps, we should try, at least, to understand the human story behind the footballer sometimes. In the meantime may I wish Jacob, Neil and Tom all the very best at their new clubs

For now, however, let us all enjoy today's game.

Bury v Swindon Town 28th February 1978

Almost 40 years ago, today's sides met on a Tuesday night in the old Division Three. The Shakers were under the helm of Bob Stokoe in his second spell as manager.

The team still harboured outside hopes of promotion, lying in 7th position, six points off the automatic promotion places. Indeed, optimism was high amongst supporters with the previous three home games ending up in comprehensive 5-2, 5-0 and 3-0 victories for the Whites.

The 16-page programme cost 15 pence. Page five featured First team coach, Billy Rudd, who provided his views on football in general and at Bury. Rudd had only recently hung up his boots having made over 200 first team appearances for the Shakers.

Like this season at Gigg Lane, the 1977-78 campaign saw the emergence of several promising youngsters including midfielder Danny Wilson, who was soon to attract a bid of £50,000 from Blackburn Rovers that was dismissed by the Board. The final game of the season also saw a debut for a certain teenage striker named Craig Madden.

Talking of the challenges faced by young players Rudd commented:

"I have seen youngsters enter into football who think that just to put the boots on makes them a player. I can tell you that anyone joining Bury has to be prepared to work and even then there can be no guarantee.

Generally speaking you can take a lad, for instance, who comes and gives everything and may still not make the grade, but at least he would have inside satisfaction of giving it his all.

On the other hand some players who have come in the game and have not really tried may look back disappointed - but then it's too late."

An advert for the Bury FC Social Club provided a tantalising taste of what supporters could enjoy after handing over the modest annual membership fee of 70 pence.

Old time and modern dancing was the highlight of Saturday nights, a discotheque took place

on Sunday evenings. Monday night was 'modern sequence night' with Bingo every Wednesday.

The game ended in a disappointing 0-0 draw in front of a midweek attendance of 4,433. The Shakers form dipped throughout the remainder of the season with only two more victories from the remaining 16 matches.

This final league position of 15th was a big let down after a promising first two thirds of the season. Swindon, meanwhile, fared slightly better ending in 10th place in the table.

Enjoy the game and the programme this afternoon.

"We are now playing some good football." That is the view of many supporters who have talked about the games played at home and away over the past two months.

These views have been echoed to personnel within the Club and speaking to First Team Coach, Billy Rudd, earlier this week, he said, "This is something we have been working more on over this season and proof of this is now showing on the field."

Billy likes players to express their views just as he did in his playing days. He believes that much can be achieved by players talking amongst themselves about the game and in general to involve himself as well.

Bill's coaching theories are the three basic principles of football—passing, control and movement. "Good control and passing ability allows players more time and space," he says, "and much has been applied to this aspect since the turn of the year. At Sheffield last Saturday some of this work came off and if we can do this more consistently, it is a step in the right direction."

One must of course be reminded that the work employed during the week does not blossom overnight and it has to be continually worked on. Summing up Billy Rudd said. "When the ball is given away, you finish up continually chasing the opposition. We have to make it difficult for any team we play to gain possession."

Mick Fogg has been supporting Bury Football Club from his very first exposure to what he describes as 'almost the love of his life' when he was 10 years old back in 1953. Sorry Mick, but if your age was a secret then that's just about blown it!

This game, he recalls, was a friendly against Wolves to celebrate the installation of floodlights at Gigg Lane, as flury were one of the first clubs to have them installed. He was with his dad, in the South Stand at the time, and there, mesmerized, began his lifelong love affair with the club.

tiorn in Bury, he moved shortly afterwards to Manchester with his mum and dad, he used to watch Manchester United and Manchester City play alternate weeks at Maine Road, because Old Trafford had been destroyed in an air raid during the Manchester blitz of 1941. Mick's family later moved back to Bury where he was drawn to the thrill of Gigg Lane, the atmosphere and being able to watch the players close-up, behind the goal,

Mick worked as an engineer when he loft school, and then when the industry deteriorated he had a career change and went into the food industry where he had a management role. Throughout this period, Mick worked as a volunteer for the club, organising coach trips for the away fixtures and selling tickets. Mick talks about the same crowd of supporters travelling to away games, week in week out, and it was on one these trips that Mick met his wife Margaret who, thankfully, he adds, loves Bury almost as much as him. They married, in 1986, and have a son called Greg, named after Mick's favourite player at the time, Greg Farrell, who played for the Shakers between 1967 and 1970.

Mick's all-time favourite player is Colin


Bell, who played for Bury between 1963 and 1966, and then, as we all know, went on to greater glory at Manchester City. Danny Mayor though, currently, stands as the player for him; "He is young", he says, "has a big future in the game and I hope he goes on to realise his ambitions."

Talking of ambitions, Mick's was always to go to Wembley, but he made a promise to himself that he would never go unless it was to watch Bury. His dream came true, in 1995, after they defeated Preston North End to get in the Play-off final where he and 10,000 other Bury supporters watched them play against Chesterfield. He has never been since.

"There are only two occasions when I have cried" Mick says, "The second was when the Bury boys came out of the tunnel at Wembley but the first was when Jamie Hoyland scored at Old Trafford when Bury were playing Manchester United. For a time, little old Bury were beating mighty Manchester United, in the 1987 League Cup, as it was then, and I was standing behind the goal watching this marvellous moment unfold with a tear in my eye. It didn't last long though because Brian Robson came on then and murdered us!"

Mick goes on to say that, since 1953, he can only have missed about 20 home games, away fixtures were harder to get to in those days but, even now, he can't possibly think about going on holiday during the football season. It's in his blood he offers, as a way of trying to explain how he feels about his football club and, sat next to him, I believe him. It's a good job Margaret is also a season ticket holder, that's all I can say!

Mick shares the common aspirations of us all; that the club progresses and continues to garner more national and international recognition due to the input and vision of the Chairman and his Board



of Directors, its move to Carrington as a training ground and its policies on Youth. As an avid supporter of the Youth games, Mick believes players such as George Miller represent the future of the club. "George has a great future", he says, "and I like him. I have always liked him since the first time I saw him three years ago."

Mick is one of those people you could talk to for an age about the club and so it was, reluctantly, when our time was up, that I asked him if he could give me a last sentence to sum up his love for Bury FC. Without a moment's hesitation he replied, "Apart from my wife and family, they are my life." You can't get much better than that can you?
