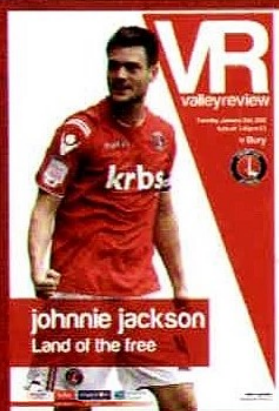
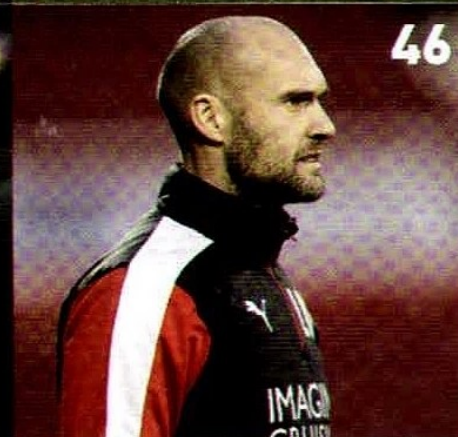

If results go our way, we could find ourselves finishing in the top half and


that has to be our aim today, before we can build on it next season.

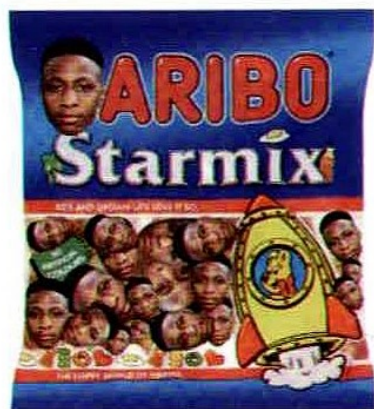

ADDICKS LATEST



U23S CROWNED SOUTHERN CHAMPIONS

Jason Euell's U23s were crowned Professional Development League 2 – South champions after defeating Millwall in SE7 on Monday evening.

The Addicks only needed one point to secure the title, but went one better to secure the bragging rights over their south-London rivals.

The first-place finish ensures that Charlton will have home advantage in the end-of-season play-offs and will face either Hull City or Bolton Wanderers in a semi-final at The Valley to determine who will advance to the final for the right to be crowned national champions.

Full details about the semi-final tie will be publicised across the club's channels once confirmed.

Meanwhile, the U18s' season came to an end with a play-off semi-final defeat at the hands of Sheffield United on April 21st.

The young Addicks had been national champions in both 2015 and 2016, but have had to settle for runners-up in the southern division this term.

Full reports from both U18 and U23 matches can be found in the academy roundup on pages 32 and 33 of Valley Review.

HUMMEL INCOMING

The Valley Superstore will be closed from Thursday, June 1st for a major refit as the club's five-year deal with kit manufacturer Hummel kicks in.

The shop will be closed for approximately four weeks while it is given a complete makeover, while the in-store ticket office will temporarily revert to the West Stand ticket office.

As well as a brand new look, once re-opened, the superstore will boast an improved selection of Charlton goods for sale, including new leisure and training wear. Meanwhile, supporters should stay tuned this summer for exciting news on the new home and away strips for the 2017/18 season, with the Addicks set to reveal bespoke kits for the first time in five years.

PLAYER OF THE YEAR TO BE REVEALED

The 2017/18 Player of the Year, as voted for by supporters, will be announced prior to kick-off this afternoon.

Fans are urged to be in their seat at around 11.45am to see the winner crowned, while awards for Supporter of the Year, Young Player of the Year, Charlton Athletic Disabled Supporters Association Player of the Year and Community Champion of the Year will also be handed out.



SHELVEY AND ELLIOT VISIT U11S

They were also paid a visit by former Addicks academy starlets Rob Elliot and Jonjo Shelvey, now both of Newcastle, who spoke to the young players about their experiences.

The academy would like to thank Valley Gold for the opportunity to provide Charlton's young players with an invaluable experience.

GALLEN NAMED HEAD OF RECRUITMENT

Steve Gallen has been appointed as the club's new Head of Recruitment.

The 43-year-old, who has known Karl Robinson for 15 years, spent nearly two decades in various coaching roles at Queens Park Rangers, including a game as Caretaker Manager in 2009.

Since leaving Loftus Road in 2016, Gallen has scouted for QPR and Wolverhampton Wanderers, and also had a spell as manager of Hong Kong Pegasus.

Gallen said: "I am very, very pleased to have joined Charlton. This is a big club with great

history.

"Karl and I have known each other for 15 years, we came up the same way in coaching. Through schoolboys, reserves and as assistants. He's gone on to do incredibly well and we've kept in touch throughout.

"There is a trust there. I trust him, he trusts me. I know what he looks for in a player. I know what a 'Karl Robinson player' looks like.

"I've just started at the club and I'm really looking forward to it. I want to identify the best players within our budget and then help do what we can to get them in."

CLARK AND BARKER TO DEPART



The club can confirm that first-team coaches Richie Barker and Simon Clark will be departing Charlton following the conclusion of this season.

Barker arrived at The Valley in December from Milton Keynes Dons where he had previously worked under current Addicks boss Karl Robinson, while Clark has been with the club since 2014.

Initially arriving as a Youth Development Phase Coach for the U15s, he quickly stepped up to coach the U18s, playing a key role in the youngsters being crowned national champions in 2015.

Later, he would take charge of the U21 on a temporary basis, before stepping up to join the first-team setup in March 2016.

Charlton would like to thank both for their contribution during their time with the club and wish them all the best in their future endeavours.

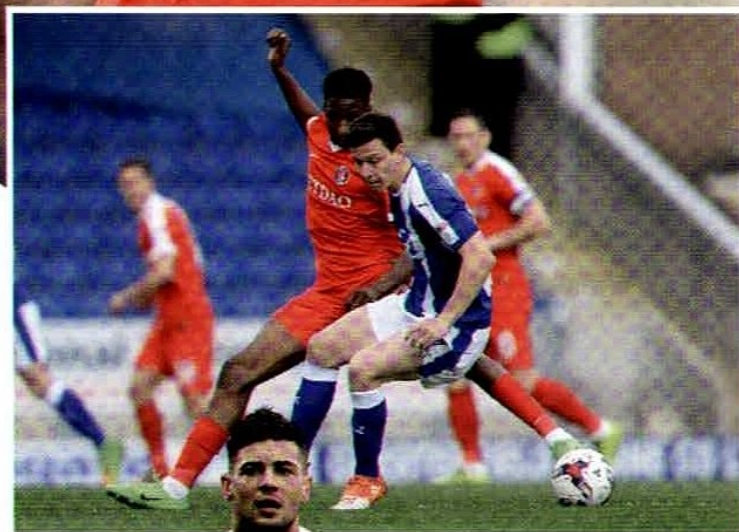

SPARROWS LANE REDEVELOPMENT GATHERS PACE

Those that have been at our Sparrows Lane training ground over the last few weeks will have noticed a real change in landscape.

Those that have been at our Sparrows Lane training ground over the last few weeks will have noticed a real change in landscape. For those that haven't, we thought it was appropriate to provide an update on how things stand ahead of a busy summer.

We currently have three separate construction sites at the training ground at present. There are over 40 construction staff on site working on both Phase II and Phase III of the redevelopment.

These changes are important for the future of our club. These new facilities are being specified to achieve Category 1 facilities standards. Car parking and access roads have restricted academy training capacities and usage levels in the past and parents of academy players have struggled with the facilities, such as parking. The new infrastructure will allow the club to expand the academy, increase contact time and offer an improved parent and family experience when attending the training ground, which will give us an opportunity to attract better players at all age groups and give us the first class facilities to hone their skills. It is not just the football club that benefits though, once completed, the training ground will provide facilities that will be used by Charlton Athletic Community Trust, Charlton Athletic Women's Team, Footscray Rugby Club, University of Greenwich and the local community.

The club's multi-million training ground redevelopment project has been split into four phases so the training ground can remain operational during the development.

Phase I has been completed and includes:

- Two 3G pitches including a replica pitch with the same dimensions of The Valley
- A water basin to service the pitches at the training ground



Initial work on Phase II began in October with building work beginning in March. It includes:

- Construction of a new synthetic community pitch
- Enhancement of the Charlton Athletic Community Trust area including:
 - Two new changing rooms
 - Classrooms
 - Consultation area
- Construction of a new 3G rugby pitch
- Increased parking
- An access road
- Services will remain accessible for the community for activities such as after school clubs, walking clubs, running, cricket, walking football

Phase III of the training ground began in April and includes:

- Renovation of natural turf pitches
- Installation of utility services in preparation for the construction of a new main training ground building

Phase IV of the training ground will begin following the completion of Phase II and Phase III:

- Construction of new training ground building
- Construction of indoor playing facility
- Final pitch renovations

CROSSING THE LINE FROM PLAYER TO COACH

It is safe to say that Johnnie Jackson has secured his status as a club legend over the last seven years since his arrival in SE7.

With his playing career nearing its end, he will begin his transition from player to coach in 2017/18, with next season being his last before he dons a tracksuit full time, with aspirations to one day manage the Addicks.

Speaking to Olly Groome, the skipper reflects on a frustrating campaign at The Valley and looks ahead to his future role as Player-Coach.

Johnnie, it's fair to say it's been another frustrating season for everyone involved.

JJ: It's been very disappointing. We set out at the start of the season with high hopes of getting promotion and that was always the aim, but we've fallen miles short of it.

The likelihood is we'll end up midtable, but that's not good enough for Charlton in League One. It's not what we were aiming for and we've fallen well short of expectations. It's not where we should be with the squad we've got, so we know we have underachieved. That's the bare truth of it.

The run-in has seen us perform well and hit some of our best form of the season. Does it show that we were somewhat better than our league standing suggests?

JJ: I think the consistency has been the

difference. The sides that have done well are the ones who have gone a month without losing, or won four or five games back-to-back. That's not something we've managed to do. We've only won back-to-back games on a couple of occasions and the run we're on now has come too late to make a difference.

We need to look at the January period where we went to Bolton and won and I thought we would kick on from there, but it went completely the other way. That was the crucial period where we needed to kick on, but we fell away and ended up miles off it.

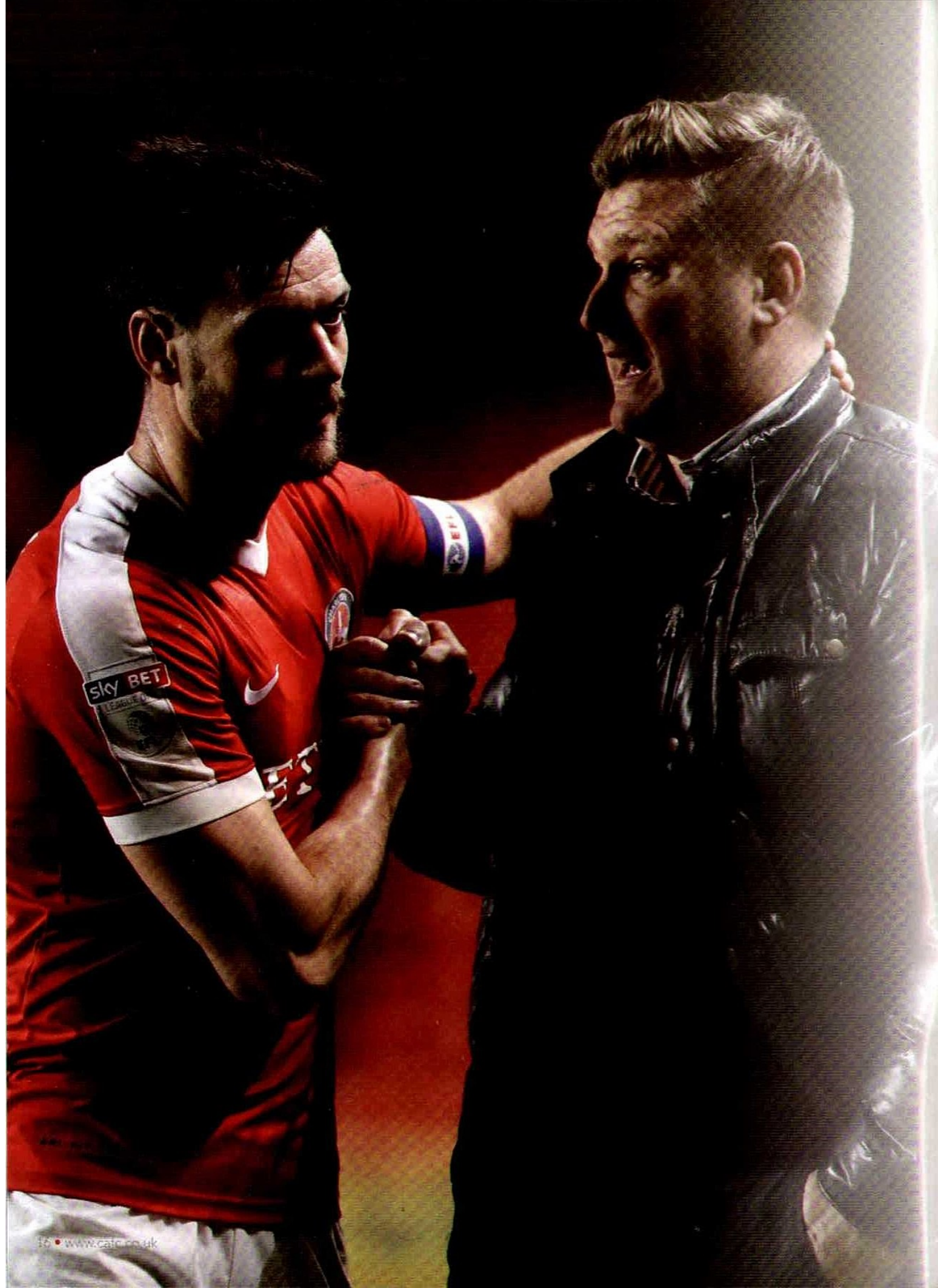
The next thing you know, you start looking over your shoulder the other way and there's a bit of pressure, so that was the key period of our season.

If you take the top two out of the equation, you look at some of the other sides up there and they are certainly no better than us on our day. But consistency is the answer.

We gave Bristol Rovers a hiding twice and they've finished a lot higher than us, but it's about that consistency that we simply haven't had.

If consistency has been the issue, can you put your finger on why that has been the case?

JJ: We've had loads of injuries – there's no getting away from that fact. I think that's affected us, but beyond that, I really don't know.

Players haven't been able to sustain the high standards that we needed. The level of performances have been too up and down. One excellent game was followed by a couple of poor ones, so the form of the players has played its part, too.

I think having that Saturday/Tuesday schedule for six or seven weeks worked against us and we came out of every game with a knee knock, having to change the team quite a lot.

But at the end of the day, the performances haven't been good enough and it's difficult to put my finger on exactly why that is.

There are some personal positives when it comes to this season, with you getting into the club's top 20 all-time scorers list and, of course, reaching the 250-appearance mark. How proud are you of your achievements with this club?

JJ: Very proud. I definitely still have some fond memories of the season and there are a couple of personal highlights. I managed to score a few goals and got to 250 appearances which are things to be proud of.

I know I'm not capable of the level of performance that I have been used to in the past and I can't be as consistent. I am well aware of that. I struggled a bit playing out wide at the start of the season and that wasn't easy for me at this stage of my career, but when I have been used in the second half of the season, in certain games, I think my performances have been better, so

I'm quite pleased that I've managed to get them in.

I have to be realistic about where I am in my career, so to get 32 appearances and five goals under my belt is not too shabby considering I'm knocking on the door of 35! So I have to take the positives from the season in that sense.

You've been laying the foundations for a future in coaching for a while now. How has that evolved this season?

JJ: Since Karl Robinson has come in, he's got me more involved. He's taken me to a few games and got me to do a few scouting reports and things like that so, even when I wasn't in the side, I was still having certain bits of input.

It wasn't so much coaching on the training pitch, but picking my brains about how I saw previous games, team selection and my general opinion really.

It's something different to what I've been used to and it's something I've really enjoyed. When you're not playing, it keeps you involved so I've felt part of it throughout most of the season, even though I haven't always been able to have an effect on the pitch.

Next season, you will be taking up a position as player-coach. When did that discussion start?

JJ: The talks have been happening for a while. I had a clause in my contract that I had to play a certain amount of games to trigger another year. I always had it in my head to get to that so I could have another year playing, with maybe a coaching role along with it and stepping up my involvement in the day-to-day coaching knowing that, realistically, my game time next year

would be even less than it was this year.

I still think, over a long season, there will be a time and a place when I can still be utilised. I'll be training every day and I'll still be fit to ensure that I will still be an asset as and when I'm needed. I didn't see any reason to stop playing and I see next year as being the real transition into the other side of it – dipping my toe into coaching, but also being available as a player as well.

I fulfilled the criteria to trigger my extra year a few weeks back, so that was very satisfying for me. I'm sure the club would have looked after me anyway, but I wanted to get to that trigger for my own peace of mind! We've already talked about the possibility of me staying around beyond next year, which is all I've ever wanted really.

Next year will be my swansong as a player and what that brings, I don't know. I might play a few games, I might play a lot, it all depends on a lot of factors, but I'm pleased I will have a role to play one way or another.

Is your long-term goal to eventually become Charlton Manager?

JJ: 100 per cent. That's what I want to do. I've been doing a lot of coaching with the academy kids this year and I do really enjoy that but, ultimately, I see myself involved with the first team because that's what I feel I'm good at.

Next year will be a big learning curve for me because I'll be more involved on the other side of things. I'll be watching more games, finding out about players and really building up my knowledge.

Beyond that, given the opportunity, I would really love to be the manager of this football club.



What needs to happen next season to ensure that this club gets back to where it needs to be?

JJ: The recruitment this summer is key. I would have thought there might be a bit of a turnaround in players so it has to be right.

I always say that if you look at any successful team, they have the characters, they are experienced at the right level and I think it's really important that you fulfil that certain criteria for a team that will get you up and it's important for us to build that this summer.

A good pre-season is also important. The gaffer needs to drill his style into the players so that will be a vital time to get the right people into the building and getting the vital work done so we're ready to hit the ground running. We have to start well to get that positive, winning mentality that will kick us on.

Finally, what message do you have for the fans as we come to the end of this season?

JJ: The support that I've had during my entire time here has been second to none. The fans have been first class and I want to thank them for that.

I know we haven't given them much to cheer about this season, but they've still got behind us which is something we're all grateful for.

Next year I would love to see us winning again, climbing the league and have the crowds come back. If we can get that feeling back that we had five years ago, where we were all together, it would be really special and I will certainly be doing all I can to help make that happen.

ON THIS DAY

RUFUS HITS WINNER AS HOME FORM CONTINUES

APRIL 30TH, 2001

The Addicks enjoyed a fine home record during their return to the Premier League in 2000/01 and earned their last of 11 league victories at The Valley on this day.

Sweden international striker Mathias Svensson opened the scoring against high-flying Ipswich Town with 12 minutes gone, powering a header home from John Robinson's left-wing cross. The lead only lasted for eight minutes, however, with Martin Reuser's teasing cross bouncing straight through a crowded area and into the bottom left-hand corner.

But Charlton, who had only been beaten twice at home all season, rallied after the break and found the winner on 57 minutes when Richard Rufus poked the ball past keeper Richard Wright from close range.



THIS WEEK IN HISTORY

APRIL 27TH, 1946

Charlton made their first FA Cup final appearance, taking on Derby County at Wembley, but ultimately lost out 4-1 after extra-time.

Bert Turner put through his own net in the 80th minute to put the Rams ahead, but he immediately made amends just one minute later by firing home an equaliser at the other end.

Derby, however, would go onto to hit three goals, scoring early in extra-time through Peter Docherty, before Jackie Stamps' brace rounded up the scoring.

APRIL 29TH, 1975

Andy Nelson's side secured promotion back to the second tier after a three-year absence with a 3-1 victory over Preston North End at The Valley.

24,659 were in attendance to see Gordon Coleman put the visitors in front with 10 minutes played, leaving nerves jangling around SE7. But Charlton got the job done after the break. Bobby Goldthorpe equalised, before Derek Hales bagged a double to spark celebrations on final day, with a third-place finish assured.

APRIL 24TH, 2000

Charlton clinched their first league title since 1935 with a 1-1 draw at Blackburn Rovers. Having already sealed promotion back to the top flight at the first time of asking, this result, coupled with Manchester City's 2-2 draw at Portsmouth, ensured that Alan Curbishley's men were crowned Division One champions.

Mathias Svensson put the Addicks ahead in the first half, while Lee Carsley's 63rd-minute penalty levelled matters for the hosts, but the draw was enough to get the champagne flowing.





F.A. CUP FINAL 1947

Celebrating 70 years

April 26th marked the 70th anniversary of Charlton's finest hour - lifting the FA Cup at Wembley Stadium after defeating Burnley in the final of the world's most famous cup competition.

Throughout this season, Valley Review has relived the historic 1946/47 campaign game-by-game with a little help from legendary manager, Jimmy Seed.

With the journey now at its conclusion, we relive one of the most glorious days in the club's history...



42. Burnley 0 Charlton 1*

April 26th, 1947

Wembley Stadium (98,215)

*after extra time

.....

After the disappointment of defeat at the hands of Derby County a year earlier, Charlton had the chance to make amends with a second consecutive appearance in the final of the world's most famous cup competition, becoming the first London club to achieve the feat.

There were five survivors in Jimmy Seed's lineup from the 1946 final, with Sam Bartram, Jack Shreeve, Bert Johnson, Don Welsh and Chris Duffy all getting a second chance of glory, while there was redemption for Peter Croker, who had missed out at Wembley 12 months earlier with a broken leg he had suffered just 10 days before the big day.

A crowd just shy of 100,000 were packed in beneath the famous old twin towers as Welsh led his players out alongside their counterparts from second-division Burnley. Referee

Jim Wiltshire, sensing the tension of the occasion, felt no need to hang around, blowing his whistle to get the match under way a full five minutes before its scheduled 3pm kick-off.

That tension, perhaps, translated into action with one reporter describing the play as "unexciting", while another said: "this must be one of the dulllest games ever on Wembley's great arena."

Indeed, one of the highlights of the game was when, for the second successive year, the ball burst while in play (this was later put down to the poor quality of leather available following the Second World War).

Chances were at a premium, but it was Charlton who looked the more likely in front of goal. Welsh tested Clarets stopper George Strong with a shot from a good position inside the penalty area, but with no goals after 90 minutes, Seed's men were heading for extra-time, just as they did in the previous final.

With the action remaining tight, it looked as if the match could be heading for a replay, before Charlton sealed their moment of glory in the 114th minute.

When a right-wing cross was headed away by a Burnley defender,



it only fell as far as Duffy who lay in wait before slamming home a first-time volley from 12 yards to bring the cup to south London.

Jimmy Seed said: "We did not play well because inside forwards had an off day. The defence was good throughout and it was not till six minutes from the end of extra time that Duffy scored with a brilliant first time shot from Robinson's centre."

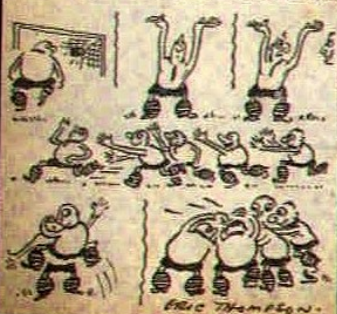

Academy Manager Steve Avory reflects on another successful season for the Addicks' youth setup and introduces next year's intake of first-year scholars.



As the season nears its end, we can reflect on another pleasing year for this club's academy.

The U23s confirmed what we thought they were capable of at the start of the season, which was to win the southern league title. They got over the line on Monday with an excellent victory over Millwall, showing exactly why we were deserved league winners.

I'm pleased for the lads and for Jason Euell, as well as the staff who work around him, because I've seen the hard work that goes into these achievements. They are a talented and mentally-strong group who have got used to winning things over these last few years and that's important going forward in their careers.

We now go into the play-offs where we have a home draw in the semi-finals and we are very capable of winning this national title.

Meanwhile, the U18s, unfortunately, lost out at the semi-final stage of the play-offs to Sheffield United, who were the strongest team this year. The boys have done very well to finish second in the league, although we have to accept, runners-up is probably as good as we've been this year. A young U18 side that augurs well for next season.

At this stage of the season, we have our scholars induction evening at The Valley, which took place on Thursday evening, where next year's intake come in to find out about their education and football apprenticeship over the next two years.

We have nine first-year scholars who will begin in July, the number an indication of what we feel is the strength of our U16 group.

Charlie Moore, from Essex, has been at the Academy for six years



and attends the full time educational project at Harris Academy. At 6ft already, he is a centre-back who has also played right back. Very athletic. Charlie has good physical attributes and also impresses with his ability to play from the back.

James Vennings is a local boy from Eltham and is another who has come through the Harris project. A central midfielder, he can also play the '10' role effectively because he's a creative player with an eye for a good pass and the ability to play under pressure. Has already played for the U18s.

Ryan Godding comes from Maidstone and signed with the academy as an U14. He plays a deeper role in the centre of midfield and has a good range of pass as well as the ability to get in goalscoring positions.

Johl Powell is another midfielder who has been with us for just over a year. Another local boy from Sidcup, he knits things together very well in terms of build-up play and gets into advanced positions effectively. Again comfortable under pressure which is important for a midfield player.

James Gody, from Peckham, has been with the Harris programme since

he was U14. He's a powerful forward with pace and has been a consistent goalscorer at Academy level and also figured for the U18s this season.

Sam Keefe has been with us since U14 and is from Croydon. He's a 6ft centre-back and a very gutsy and determined defender who makes life very difficult for opponents. A winning mentality.

Tyron Kirunda lives in Peckham, but was born in Amsterdam. Another 6ft centre-back, he has pace and is a left-footer who brings balance to the central defender positions. Very athletic player.

Joseph Osaghae is a goalkeeper we brought in a year ago and has the athletic qualities we look for. He's tall and agile and he has worked very well with our Goalkeeper Coach Lee Smelt this year. Originally from Germany, he now lives in East Dulwich.

Kareem Isiaka, from Thamesmead, is an exciting forward who is very quick. He prefers to play in wider positions up front and has been a consistent goalscorer throughout his three years at the academy. Has played for the U18s this season.

We look forward to having them all with us as first-year scholars from July.

I'd like to finish by thanking all the fans who have supported our U18s and U23s throughout the course of the season. It never ceases to amaze me just how much our supporters follow the exploits of our young players and we really do appreciate that.

I'd also like to thank all of the academy staff for another good season and it's been excellent to see, once again, a number of academy graduates make their mark on the first team this season.

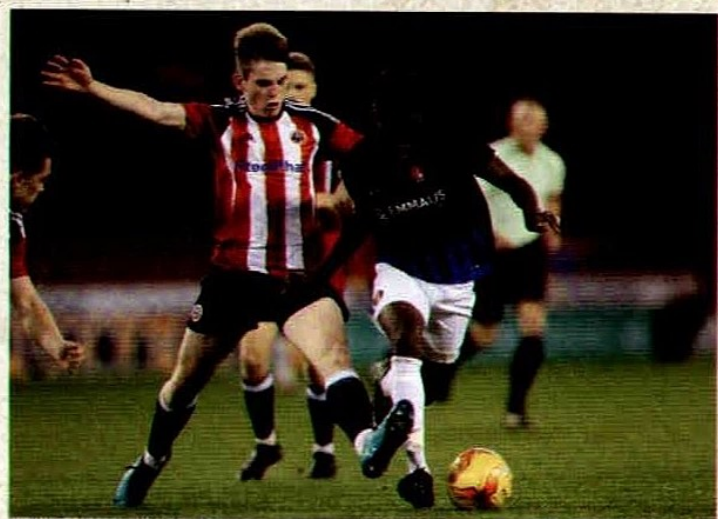
Jordan Hallam made no mistake with the penalty, firing it straight down the middle to make it 1-0.

Dimitar Mitov was called into action shortly after, making a superb save to get down and tip Noel Leighton's goal-bound header away from the bottom left corner.

The Lions threw all they had at the Addicks, but the hosts stood firm and managed the game brilliantly to play out the rest of the match and earn the points that were needed to seal the title and gain home advantage in the end-of-season play-offs, where they will take on either Hull City or Bolton Wanderers in the semi-final.

Which player did you look up to as a kid?

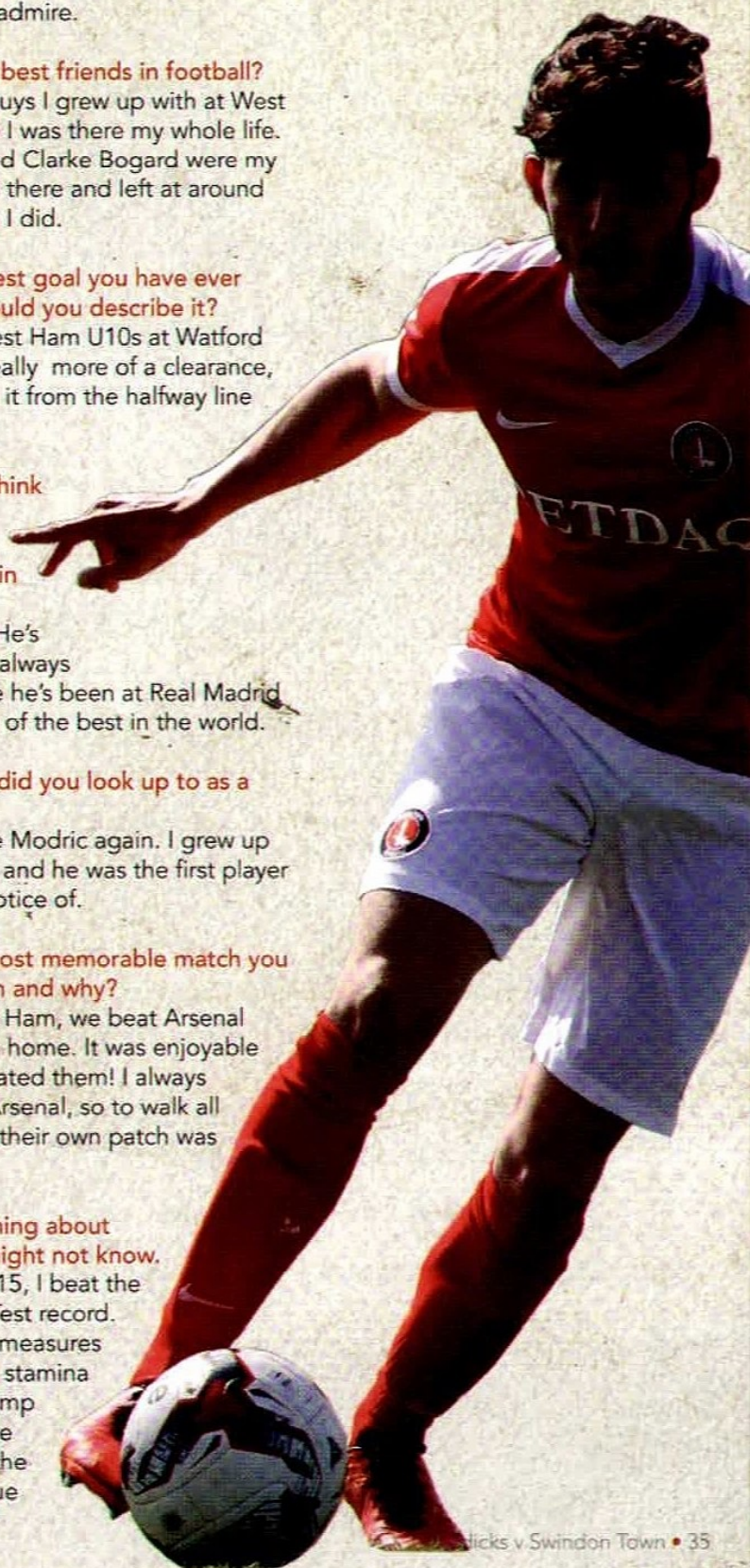
That would be Modric again. I grew up as a Spurs fan and he was the first player I really took notice of.

FEMALE FOCUS

The Charlton women's team will next season be looking to emulate what Tottenham Hotspur have done this term, after two victories against the newly crowned FA Women's Premier League (FAWPL) South champions in the space of three days shows what they are capable of, writes David Brenchley.

Until Sunday, Spurs had been unbeaten all season, bar an SSE Women's FA Cup defeat to FA Women's Super League 1 side Arsenal – before their impressive run was halted by Charlton's 3-2 victory on their own soil.

And Tuesday saw an even more important 2-1 victory that saw the Addicks retain their Capital Women's Cup trophy for the fourth successive season.

It showed there is plenty of character in Charlton's ranks, having already been on the losing side to Spurs twice this season, in both the FAWPL South home league match and the Ryman Women's Cup final – and having gone a goal down both times this week.

And midfielder Charley Clifford says she is excited by what her side can do next season under the guidance of first team coach Riteesh Mishra, who has already had a huge influence on performances and results.

"I don't think we would have done what we did [coming back from a goal down] at the start of the season,"

Clifford said.

"Riteesh has come in and got really behind us, worked with us on how to prevent things like letting our heads drop and from Christmas onwards we've really started to come together and we're working hard for each other, not just ourselves.

Having that togetherness and the mentality to go on to win like we have done tonight and come back from 1-0 down shows that something's working and that something's starting to click now and that everyone's on the same wavelength.

"We left it too late this year [to challenge properly for the league title] but if we can all stick together and we know that we all want the same things, which is what we've been working towards since Christmas, then fingers crossed things are looking up for next year.

"We want to do what Tottenham have done this year in the league, as well as the cups."

Next up, it's the decider between two sides that know each other so

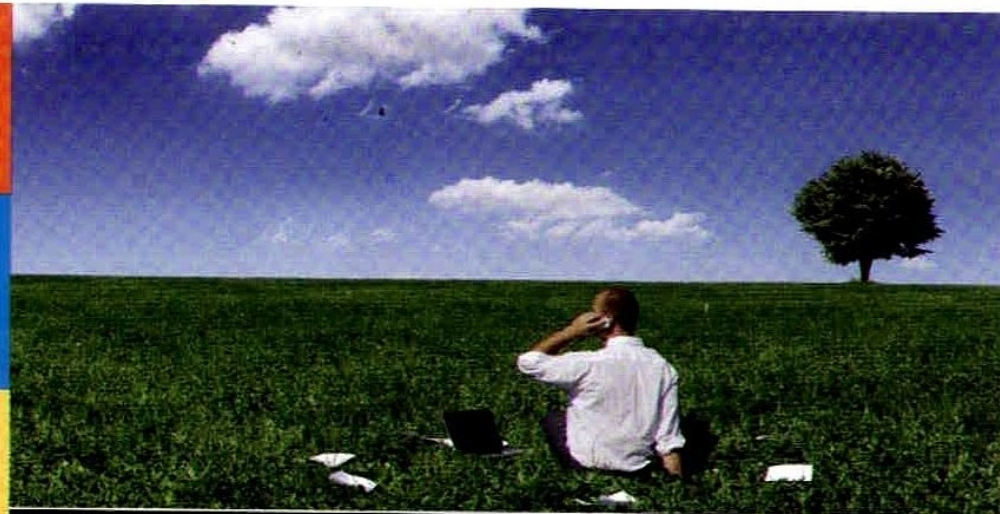
well – the FAWPL Cup final takes place on Sunday 7 May at Broadhall Way, Stevenage, at 2pm.

That is the one both sides will be wanting to win, and it is Spurs who this time go into it as defending champions, with Charlton having won it the previous year.

Clifford reckons the momentum is all now firmly with her side. "[The FAWPL Cup has] been going since I was a kid and that is the one that everyone wants to win," she added. "We've got the momentum now because we've just beaten them twice within a week so fingers crossed we can take that into the game and do what we did [on Tuesday]."

THE PLATINUM COLLECTION

Football historian LEIGH EDWARDS highlights leading Swindon Town figures and achievements from 70 post-war League seasons

CLASSIC CAMPAIGNS

1968-69

Don Rogers starred as Swindon Town achieved an epic League Cup and promotion 'double' in 1968-69. Early pace-setters in the Third Division, they lost 1-0 at home to Watford in the title 'decider' watched by 28,898 and finished runners-up on goal average. Swindon defeated Torquay 2-1, Bradford City 4-3, Blackburn 1-0, Coventry 3-0, Derby 1-0 and Burnley 3-2 in the League Cup before beating Arsenal 3-1 after extra-time in the Wembley final: Peter Downsborough, Rod Thomas, John Trollope, Joe Butler, Frank Burrows, Stan Harland, Don Heath, Roger Smart, John Smith (Willie Penman), Peter Noble, Don Rogers.

1985-86

Swindon Town stormed to the Fourth Division title with a record 102 points in 1985-86. Lou Macari's side made a poor start in the League but defeated Sunderland and Sheffield Wednesday en route to the Milk Cup fourth round. Kenny Allen arrived from Torquay and Dave Bamber from Portsmouth as Swindon soared to the top of the table with 14 wins in 16 matches. They set a club record of 13 consecutive home victories with a 3-1 win over Burnley and clinched the title with a 1-1 draw at Mansfield. Charlie Henry and Colin Gordon scored 35 goals between them, while skipper Colin Calderwood was ever-present.

1992-93

Player-manager Glenn Hoddle was a key figure in Swindon Town's 1992-93 First Division play-off final success. Swindon were early pace-setters and new signing Craig Maskell grabbed a hat-trick in a 4-1 win over Cambridge United. They went second after a 5-1 demolition of Notts County, then overcame a lean spell with Ross MacLaren's return inspiring a run of seven victories in nine games. Dave Mitchell netted three times in a 6-4 win at Birmingham and Swindon qualified for the play-offs in fifth position. They defeated Tranmere 5-4 on aggregate, then gained a thrilling 4-3 win over Leicester in the Wembley final.

1995-96

Swindon Town stormed to the Second Division title under player-boss Steve McMahon (pictured) in 1995-96. They had plummeted from the top-flight to Second Division and newcomers included Wayne Allison, Steve Finney and Mark Seagraves. Swindon were early leaders, winning seven of their first nine games, and Kevin Horlock netted a hat-trick in a 4-1 victory at Bristol Rovers. They remained in pole position and took Southampton to an FA Cup fifth round replay. Ian Culverhouse and Mark Robinson were ever-present, while leading scorer Wayne Allison and Shaun Taylor also starred as they won the title by nine points.



WN

MANAGING TO SUCCEED

LOU MACARI

Former Scotland international midfielder Lou Macari managed Swindon Town to the Fourth Division title in 1985-86. He won all three major Scottish honours with Celtic before moving to Manchester United in January 1973, featuring in three FA Cup finals including their 1977 triumph. Joining Swindon as player-boss in July 1984, he also guided them to promotion in 1986-87 and Second Division play-offs in 1988-89. He left in July 1989 to manage West Ham and briefly Birmingham before leading Stoke City to the Second Division title in 1992-93. Rejoining Celtic as boss, he later managed Stoke again and Huddersfield Town.

GLENN HODDLE

Ex-England international midfielder Glenn Hoddle plotted Swindon Town's 1992-93 First Division play-off final triumph. Signing professional for Spurs in April 1975, he starred in their 1981 and 1982 FA Cup final successes and was a finalist again shortly before joining Monaco in June 1987. He helped win the French League title in 1987-88 and was appointed Swindon's player-boss in April 1991, scoring once in 64 League games while at the County Ground. Moving to Chelsea in a similar capacity in June 1993, he guided them to the 1994 FA Cup final and has since managed England, Southampton, Spurs and Wolves.



FAB FOUR

MIKE SUMMERBEE

Brilliant winger Mike Summerbee was capped eight times by England after leaving Swindon Town. Initially with Cheltenham Town, he moved to the County Ground in March 1960 and was an important figure in Swindon's 1962-63 promotion success. He netted 39 goals in 218 League games prior to joining Manchester City in August 1965, amassing a vast collection of domestic and European honours under the Joe Mercer/Malcolm Allison partnership at Maine Road. Later playing for Burnley, Blackpool and Stockport County, he is a successful businessman and his son Nicky also starred for Swindon Town.

DON ROGERS

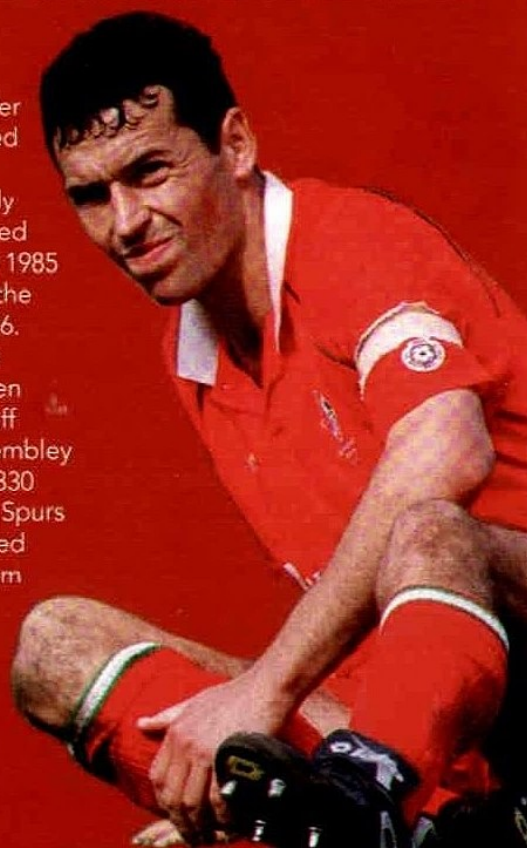
England U-23 international winger Don Rogers scored twice in Swindon Town's 1969 League Cup final success. Signing professional at the County Ground in October 1962, he featured in Swindon's 1962-63 promotion campaign and was ever-present in four successive seasons. He starred as Swindon won promotion again in 1968-69 and the Anglo-Italian Cup in 1970, reuniting with Bert Head at Crystal Palace in November 1972. Moving to QPR in September 1974, he rejoined Swindon in March 1976 and netted 148 goals in 412 League games overall for the Robins. He has since run his own sports shop in Swindon.

JOHN TROLLOPE

Long-serving left-back John Trollope holds Swindon Town's appearance record. Signing professional at the County Ground in July 1960, he made his League debut in Swindon's 1-1 draw at home to Halifax a month later and was ever-present in seven consecutive seasons including the 1962-63 promotion success. He featured in Swindon's 1968-69 promotion and League Cup 'double' campaign as well as their 1970 Anglo-Italian Cup final triumph. Scoring 21 goals in 770 League games, he was their coach, then manager between November 1980 and March 1983. Later Swindon's youth team boss, he was awarded the MBE.

COLIN CALDERWOOD

Commanding central defender Colin Calderwood was capped 36 times by Scotland after leaving Swindon Town. Initially with Mansfield Town, he moved to the County Ground in July 1985 and starred as Swindon won the Fourth Division title in 1985-86. He also helped the Robins to win promotion in 1986-87, then featured in two further play-off finals including their 1993 Wembley triumph. Scoring 20 times in 330 League games, he moved to Spurs in July 1993 and later appeared for Aston Villa and Nottingham Forest. He managed Northampton Town, Forest and Hibernian before assisting Chris Hughton at various clubs.





MANAGER LUKE WILLIAMS

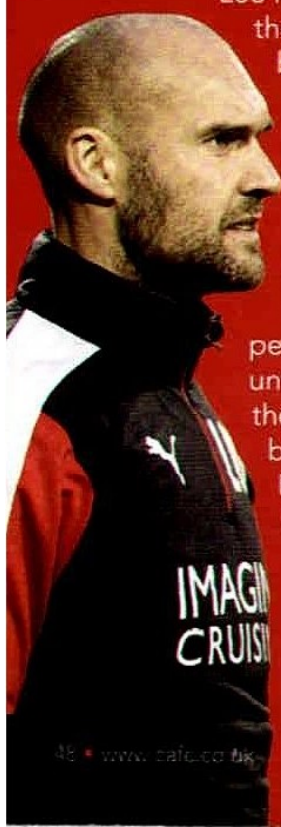
Plying his trade in non-League for the duration of his playing career, the 35-year-old Swindon boss played for Ashford Town, Bishop's Stortford, Tunbridge Wells and Tonbridge Angels before starting his coaching career as an FA skills coach.

He moved into coaching roles within the youth setups of both Leyton Orient and West Ham United and, in 2010, became Brighton & Hove Albion's U21 manager, a role he kept for three years.

Williams first arrived at Swindon as First Team Coach in 2013 and then became assistant to Mark Cooper helping the Robins to the League One play-off final in 2015. Following Cooper's departure, he continued as assistant to Caretaker Manager and Chairman,

Lee Power, and then Martin Ling before taking the hotseat himself as caretaker in December 2015.

In January 2016, he was appointed as permanent manager until the end of the season, before being named Head Coach in March 2016.

23-year-old stopper began his career in the youth ranks with Brentford before joining Tottenham Hotspur's academy in 2012. He then moved on to Liverpool a year later, taking in a season-long loan at Swindon in 2015/16, before signing permanently last summer. A Chile U20 international.

BRADLEY BARRY

Right-back who learned his trade in Brighton & Hove Albion's academy and was snapped up by the Robins following his release in 2015. The nephew of Everton midfielder Gareth Barry, he has made a total of 64 appearances for the club.

NATHAN THOMPSON

A product of Swindon's youth setup, the 26-year-old defender made his debut for the club in 2008 and has gone on to appear 188 times for the first team. He was named as the Robins' Player of the Year in both 2013 and 2014 and has played 37 times this season, more than any other outfield player.

RAPHAEL ROSSI BRANCO

Brazilian-born defender made his professional debut for Porto Alegre in his home country, before arriving at Brighton after a successful trial. Contract issues saw him move to Whitehawk in

2013 where he won the Isthmian League, but he was brought to Swindon shortly after. Has made 130 appearances for the Robins.

ROHAN INCE

The defensive midfielder enjoyed a loan spell with Yeovil Town as a youngster at Chelsea's academy and made a permanent move to Brighton in 2013. He made 90 appearances for the Seagulls over the next three seasons before joining Fulham on loan in 2016 and arrived at the County Ground on a temporary basis in January.

CONOR THOMAS

6ft 1in midfielder emerged through the ranks at Coventry City's academy, making 117 first-team appearances for the Sky Blues. The 23-year old is a former England U18 international and joined Swindon on a three-year deal last July.

CHARLIE COLKETT

20-year-old midfielder joined on loan from Chelsea in January. An England youth international, he has represented his country at every level from U16 to U20 and appeared on the first-team bench at Stamford Bridge towards the end of last season. Had previously been on loan with Bristol Rovers earlier this term, before arriving in Wiltshire.

BEN GLADWIN

Currently on loan from Queens Park Rangers, the midfielder represented a number of non-League clubs including Windsor & Eton, Reading Town and Hayes & Yeading, before Swindon signed him from Marlow in 2013. Impressing over his first two seasons in League football, QPR brought him to Loftus Road in 2015 with the Robins now having loaned him back on two occasions.

JONATHAN OBIKA

Formerly of Tottenham Hotspur, the striker spent time on loan with Charlton in both 2013 and 2014. The 26-year old also had loan stints at Yeovil Town, Millwall, Crystal Palace, Peterborough United and Brighton before joining Swindon permanently in 2014. Has netted 28 times in 101 appearances.



THE LOWDOWN

Swindon's five-season stay in League One came to an end last weekend, with a home defeat to Scunthorpe United confirming their relegation to League Two.

Their last relegation to the fourth tier came in 2011, but they bounced back at the first time of asking and Head Coach Luke Williams, along with Director of Football, Tim Sherwood, will be hoping to repeat the feat in 2017/18.

The Robins head into final day with a record of 11 wins, 11 draws and 23 defeats from their 45 league games this season.

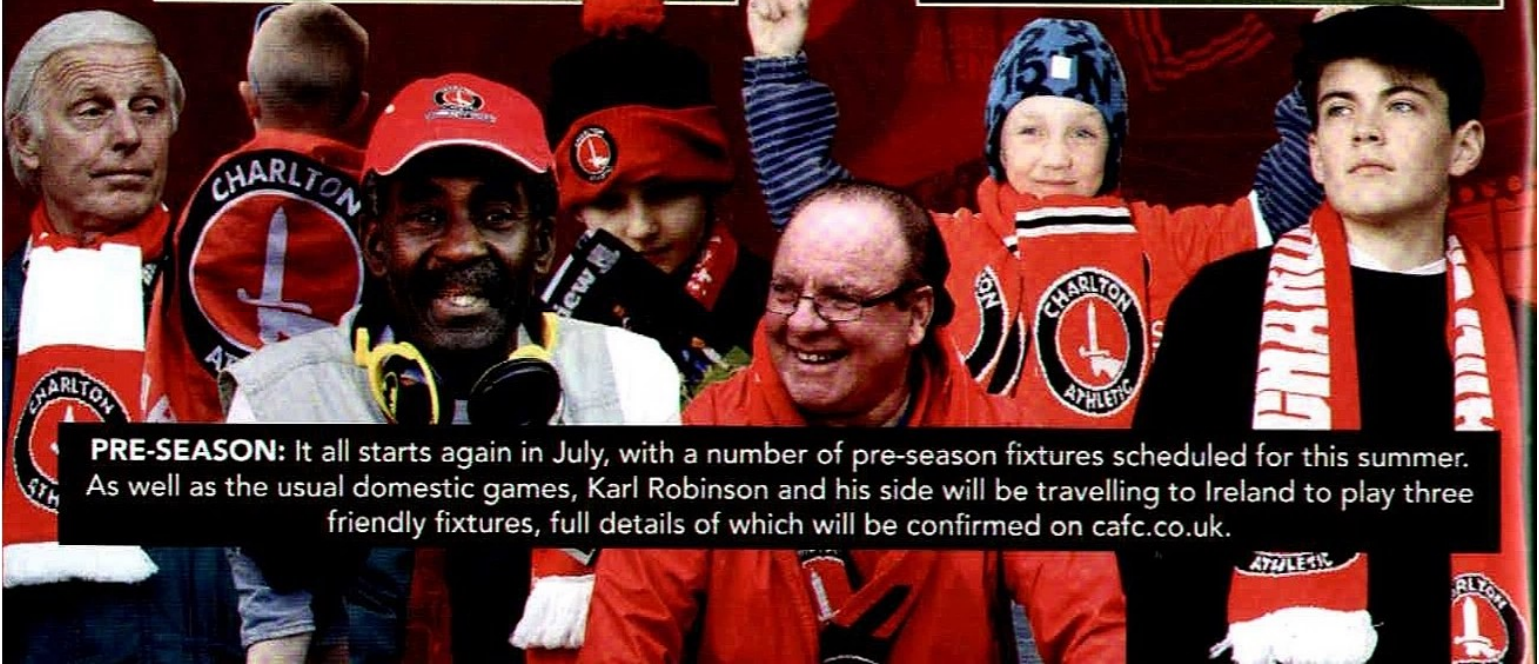

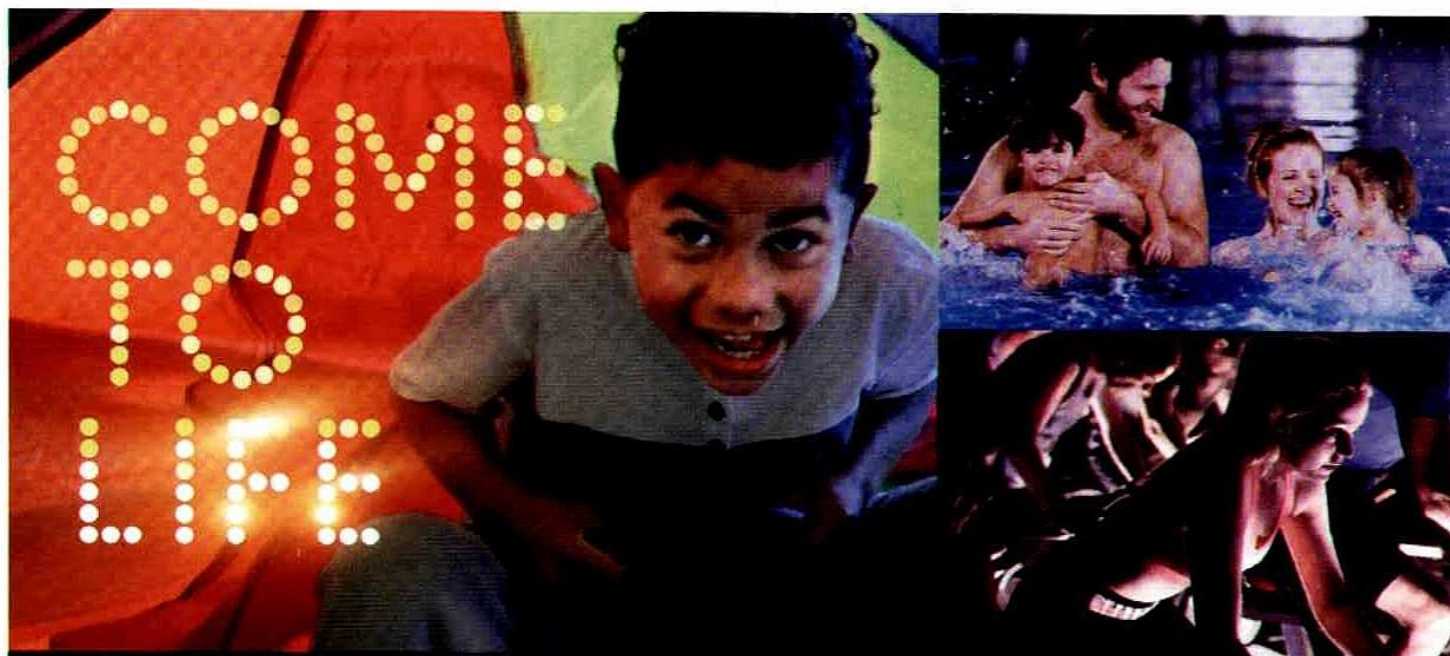

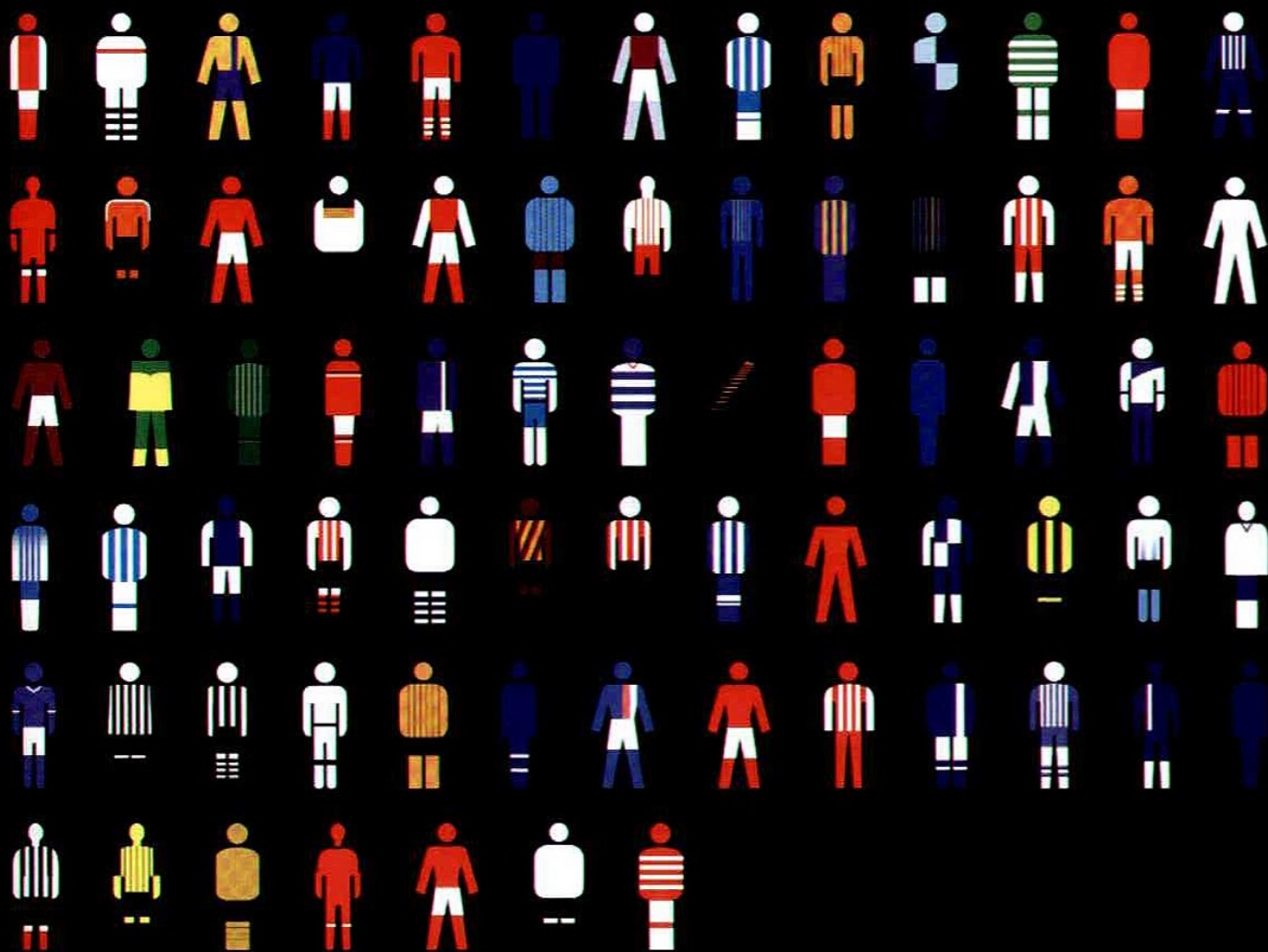
